Chapter I

THE MANDATE AND THE COMPLAINTS FALLING WITHIN IT

The Mandate

The Human Rights Commission of Sri Lanka appointed this Committee under section 11(b) of the Human Rights Commission Act No: 21 of 1996 to inquire into complaints it has received regarding disappearances and removal of persons from their residences in Jaffna, Kilinochchi and Vavuniya Districts during the period 1990 to 1998 and report on the following matters.

- Whether the persons in the list provided by the Guardians' Association of those Arrested and Disappeared from the North, The Displaced North Muslims Organization, and the complaints pertaining to this period received by the Regional Office of the Human Rights Commission in Jaffna as per letter dated 15th December, 2002 sent by the Regional Co-ordinator, Jaffna, have been involuntarily removed or had disappeared from their places of residence during the period mentioned by the complainants;
- All the circumstances pertaining to the alleged involuntary removals or disappearances;
- The present condition and whereabouts of the persons alleged to have been so removed or to have so disappeared;
- Reports made by complainants that the missing persons are being held in unidentified prisons & place of detention;
- The evidence available for identifying the person or persons responsible for these alleged disappearances and the findings based on such evidence;
- The relief, if any, that should be provided to parents spouses and dependents of the persons alleged to have been removed or disappeared;

In conducting its proceedings the Committee should maintain a high degree of transparency, to enable the complainants to participate as appropriate in the search for evidence and information pertaining to all the circumstances of the disappearances and should keep the complainants informed of the progress made as the inquiry proceeds.

If in the course of its inquiries the committee deals with cases of complainants, particularly women and children who are in severely distressed circumstances and who may be in need of special care and support, the Committee should report such cases to the Commission for special relief.

For the purpose of enabling the Committee to conduct its investigations and perform its functions the Commission delegates to the Committee the relevant powers of investigation the Commission exercises under part 2 of the Act and in particular sections 18, 19 and 21.

Complaints falling within the Mandate

A total of 327 complaints were handed to the Committee for inquiry and report as follows:

The Committee had nine sessions in Jaffna with sittings mainly in the Regional Office of the Human Rights Commission. Sittings were also conducted in Colombo, Chavakachcheri, Kodikamam, Chunnakam and Manipay with a view to sit as near as possible to places where a considerable number of complainants of disappearances live.

Of these 327 complaints, 35 complainants could not be traced¹, and 9 were traced but did not respond although summons had reached them twice. Thus only 283 complaints could be inquired into. Of these 3 were duplicate complaints from different members of the family of the disappeared.

* Three of them had disappeared in 2002 (outside the prescribed time frame) while the other disappearance had occurred in Colombo (outside the prescribed districts).

¹ An advertisement in the local Tamil Newspapers in Jaffna to trace 45 Tamil complainants who could not be found at the addresses given by them, resulted in the Committee tracing 20 of them. Another advertisement in a National Tamil Newspaper to trace the remaining 25 and 10 Muslim complainants who too could not be found at the addresses given by them, yielded no response. Thus 35 complainants could not be traced.

Thus the number of disappearances we had to inquire into was reduced to 280. Of these 10 were in respect of females who had disappeared.

Of these 281², in three cases the persons alleged to have disappeared had later been found in the prisons, two of whom had been subsequently discharged by the Courts. A synopsis of the evidence in these cases is given below:

Complt No : CHA/067

Victim : N. Pradeepan
Complainant : T. Selvarani

There is evidence that the victim had been arrested in January 1998 and released in July 1998. He had been arrested by the army after an LTTE bomb went off near his house and had been assaulted and tortured while in custody. During the period of detention he had been kept for 2 days at Chavakachcheri, a month at KKS, 8 days at Anuradhapura and four months at Kalutara. He had been released on a Habeas Corpus Application being filed. During the period of detention the Police came on the scene only when he had to be taken to the Anuradhapura Courts for the Habeas Corpus case.

The victim had marks such as cigarette burns, beatings, eye trouble and pain in the chest caused through suffocation caused by his head being covered with a bag with a little petrol in it, indicating that he had been tortured in custody. The victim spoke of several others arrested by the army having been similarly treated.

Complt No : CHA/106

Victim : S. Kirubaharan
Complainant : S. Theivanai

There is evidence that the victim had been arrested by the army on 16.01.97 at the sentry point opposite Varany Maha Vidyalaya and taken to the army camp in Varany. He had been released 3 days later. Only the complainant was present on the date of inquiry. When summoned for the next date the victim did not attend. The complainant informed the Committee that the victim was too scared to come and give evidence on what happened to him while in custody.

The victim is said to be an LTTEer who is still in custody at Kalutara. The complainant had received information to that effect and that he is there under a new name and is convinced that it is so. In view of this the Committee did not pursue this complaint.

Thus these three are no longer in the category of disappeared persons. In another case, the army who arrested the person concerned in the North had found him to be diabetic and very ill. They sent him to Colombo for treatment at the General hospital. The victim had vanished from the hospital in Colombo before he could be treated for his illness. Another had been released by Courts but had gone missing once more. In one case it was found that the evidence of the complainant was incoherent which made it difficult for the Committee to decide on the date or the circumstances of the disappearance. In these three cases, the investigations could not be pursued further.

Our mandate was to inquire into, report on and make recommendations in respect of the disappearances of persons named in the 327 complaints referred to us by the Human Rights Commission. Four Presidential Commissions of Inquiry into Involuntarily Removals and Disappearances of Persons have reported on a total of about 30,000 complaints. The complaints referred to us constitute only a minor fraction of the total number of disappearances that had occurred in Sri Lanka, although it may form a significant proportion of those who disappeared from Jaffna during the period 1990 to 1998. It transpired during our inquiries that many complaints of disappearances from Jaffna, and a very much higher number of complaints from elsewhere in the North and East are yet to be taken up for investigation.

We consider it imperative that every complaint of disappearance should be investigated as early and as exhaustively as possible, that the complainants of the disappearances should be informed of the findings in respect of their complaints, and that the reports of these investigations should be published and discussed in Parliament and many other public fora.

In writing this report we have had the benefit of access to the four Reports of the Presidential Commissions, in particular, to the very comprehensive Final Report of the All Island Commission of Inquiry into Involuntary Removals and Disappearances of Persons published in March 2001, which we have quoted extensively. None of these Reports have been presented to Parliament and there has been little or no public discussions on any of the observations and recommendations made in them. We trust that our Report will be published early and that there will be extensive and in-depth public discussion of all the Reports and the recommendations referred to therein. We also trust that effective action will be taken on the recommendations without undue delay.

Irrespective of the ethnic or political affiliation of the victims and the perpetrators of the crimes, each incident of political violence diminishes us collectively. The President of the Peruvian Truth and Reconciliation Commission has, in presenting his Final Report on 30th August, 2003 stated as follows: "The last two decades of the 20th century were marked by horror and dishonour for Peruvian society". Our record of politically motivated assassinations and disappearances covers even more than two decades of "horror and dishonour for Sri Lankan Society". We need to erase this terrible blot on the history of what has been known as the Dharma Dweepa and as the Island of Serendipity. But such blots do not fade away. To remove them and to prevent re-eruption we need to collectively diagnose their causes and work out effective remedial and preventive measures.

We had a belated Truth Commission with a restricted mandate, limited resources, and covering the period 1981 to 1984 only. Peace is yet elusive and it may be premature for the effective functioning of a comprehensive Truth and Reconciliation Commission. Hopefully in the near future, when conditions are more conducive, we need such a Commission with a broad mandate, adequate resources, and covering a period going back from the present, to at least the 1970s.

Of the other persons who gave evidence before us, we need to make special mention of Ms. Maheswari Velautham, Attorney-at-law, who had shown commendable courage and initiative and had done much valuable work in her capacity as the head of the Home for Human Dignity.

Several persons responded to our invitation and gave evidence but some others declined to do so. We annex two tables listing the persons whom we sought to interview and indicating their responses; one of them is in respect of army personnel whose names transpired in our investigations and the other lists those whose evidence we considered necessary for our purposes, but did not respond to our requests.

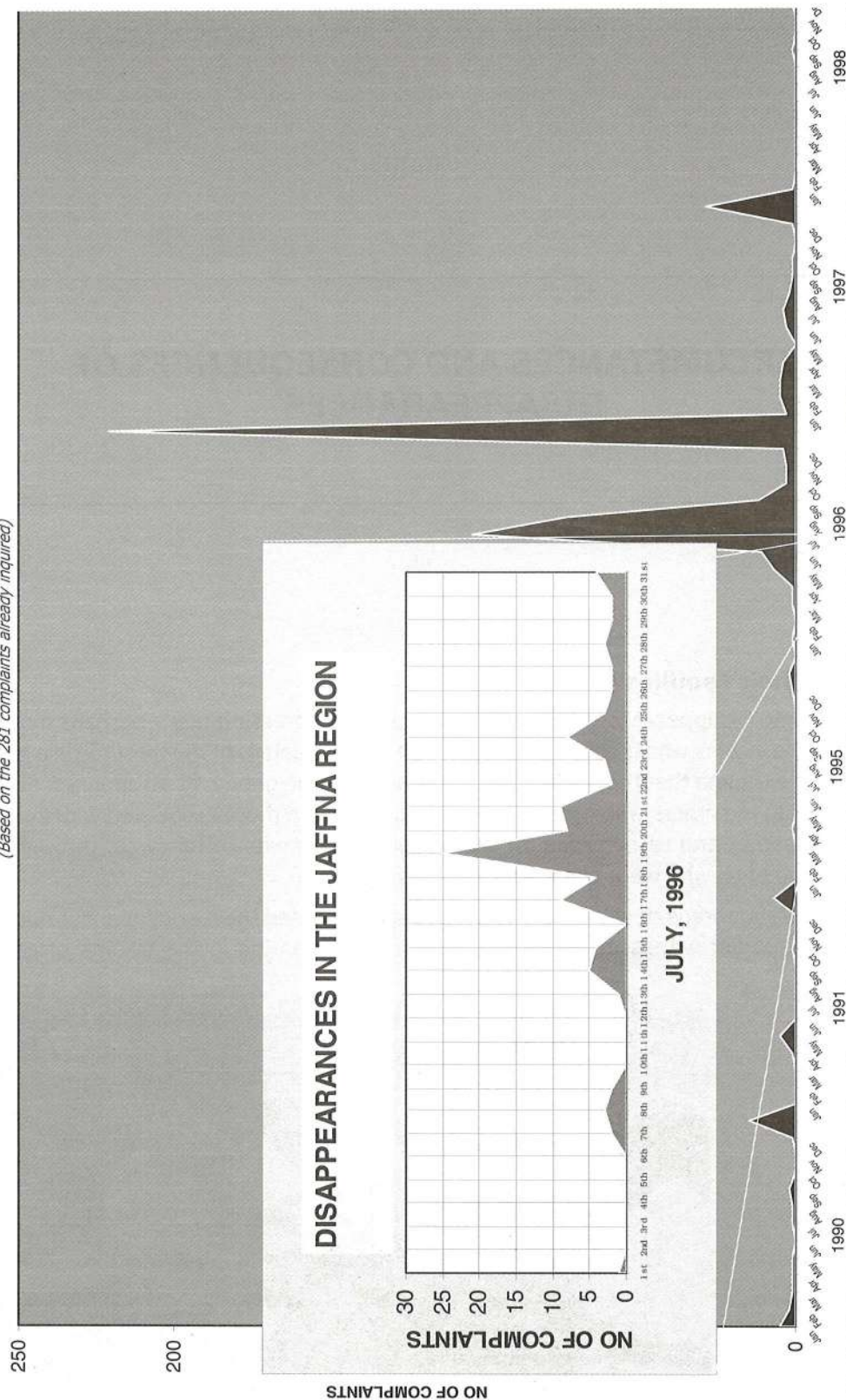
One positive outcome of our interventions was the belated payment of a modest sum of money to one of the victims of an army atrocity. These cases¹ were exceptional in that we had documentary evidence from a contemporary news item in the Udayan paper of 10.12.98² where Senior Army Official, Major General Lohan Gunawardena, had publicly admitted the wrong doing by the army personnel with a promise to punish the culprit while apologising to the victim and the people of Jaffna for the unfortunate incident. He had promised that justice would be done. Since we had no evidence that the matter had been pursued any further, we contacted Major General Lohan Gunawardena. He gave evidence before us along with the Legal Advisor of the Army. Consequently a sum of Rs. 50,000/= is being paid to the mother whose 2 children (aged 3 months and 13 years) had been shot dead in cold blood while they were at home with the mother. She had been severely wounded in the neck and suffers a major permanent disability. In this case the perpetrator had been charged for murder in the courts and had been subsequently released on bail. He had failed to attend court on the subsequent date and is absconding since then. We wish to record our appreciation of the initiative of Major General Lohan Gunawardena in issuing the statement to the Udayan Newspaper of 10/12/98 and his intervention to make the payment of Rs. 50,000/= to A. Anandaranee, the mother of the two children.

Chapter II

CIRCUMSTANCES AND CONSEQUENCES OF DISAPPEARANCES

Victims and their Families

The Inquiry into Disappearances has been a painful and depressing task - perhaps most so for the families of the victims who, in giving evidence, had to recall details of the most terrible tragedies and to re-live the trauma that they, their loved ones and their neighbours had endured. Perhaps it was also painful to the others who gave evidence, including even those associated with institutions who were accused of and responsible for the tragedies. This was certainly so, throughout the Inquiry, for those of us who were engaged in conducting it.

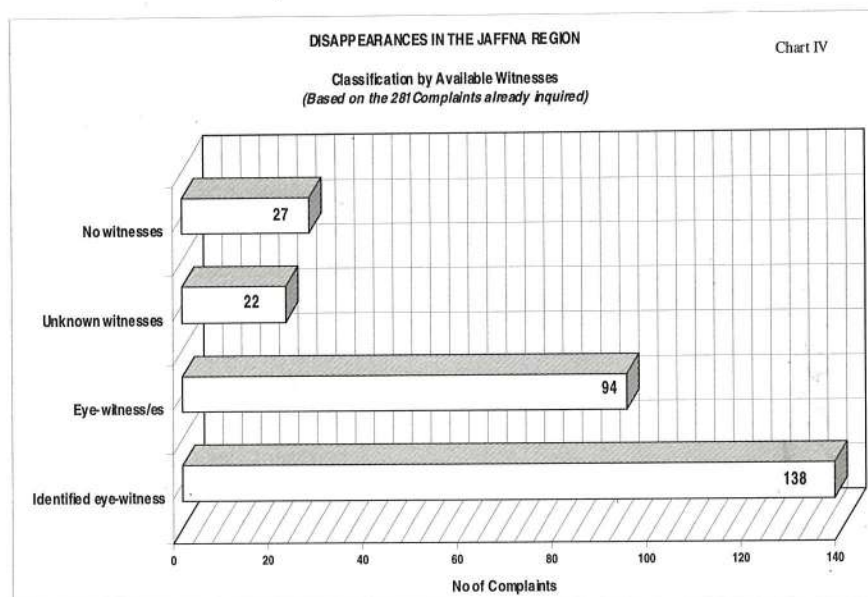
We talked with hundreds of witnesses, and heard and recorded their evidence, but nothing we had heard from earlier witnesses could immunize us from sharing in the trauma of each new witness.

A major redeeming feature of the exercise was the response of the witnesses. Clearly the families of the victims, almost without exception, desired that the investigations should be thorough and conclusive.

(One of these is 'Eye-witnesses who gave evidence'; the other is 'Eye-witnesses referred to by those who gave evidence')



97 percent of those who received our invitation (or others on behalf of those who were away or incapacitated) readily chose to give evidence, although we offered no inducements, not even reimbursement of their travel costs which many of them could ill afford to bear. Notwithstanding recurrent frustrations arising from numerous earlier complaints and inquiries that yielded no results, the complainants seemed to be

keen to unburden themselves in the faint hope that something may come out of this inquiry to put an end to their misery. That the witnesses could speak to all three Commissioners in Tamil - the only language that many of the concerned families could understand - clearly made a difference. Several witnesses returned to supply additional documentation or to offer supplementary evidence or with other witnesses to back up their own evidence. We assured them that we will complete our investigations as speedily as possible and that, while we could not guarantee the return nor provide proof of the fate of the victim, we would come to an early conclusion on each disappearance, include it in our report, and also communicate it to the relevant complainant. Sadly, in nearly every case, we have to confirm that the victim had disappeared but, hopefully, our report will help the complainants to accept the disappearances, to end their search for their missing loved ones, and to begin the process healing and of recovery.

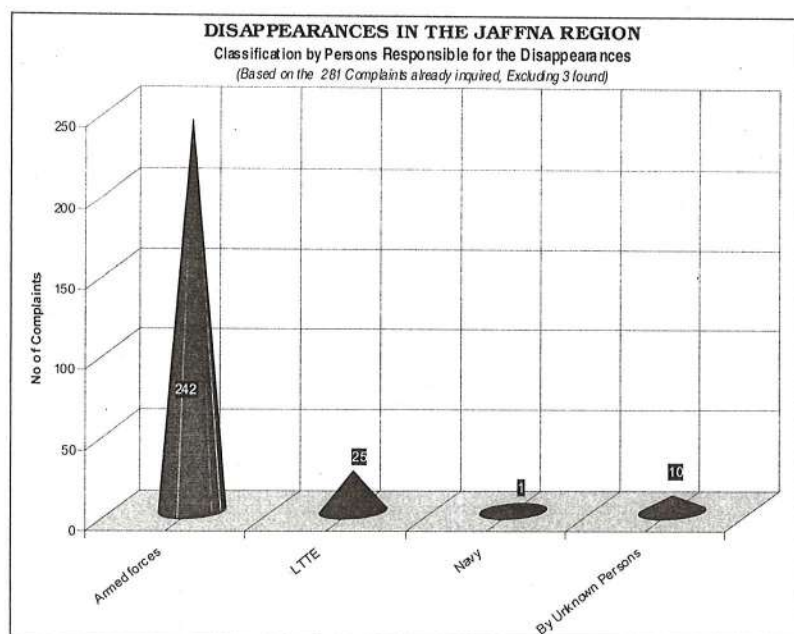
The Accused

The question is often asked as to who wants the past investigated and who does not. Clearly, the victims do, whereas those directly and indirectly responsible for the crimes, and those who favour a cover up, do not. Though we had overwhelming co-operation from the families of the victims, the same cannot be said of several of the others whose evidence we needed. In the case of the army, we gave details such as dates, camp locations and short and/or long names by which army personnel were known locally, and requested that we be given their present locations to have the opportunity to interview them¹.

We secured through informal inquiries the correct names and designations of two army personnel in service and one in (Figure 7) prison. We recorded their evidence, but were effectively denied access to many others whose evidence was of critical relevance. In those cases it was reported (vide correspondence² annexed), that the details we had given were insufficient to establish the identity of any of the service personnel concerned, in spite of the fact that, on their own admissions, the CID is investigating into the complaints against some of the persons alleged to be responsible for causing disappearances.

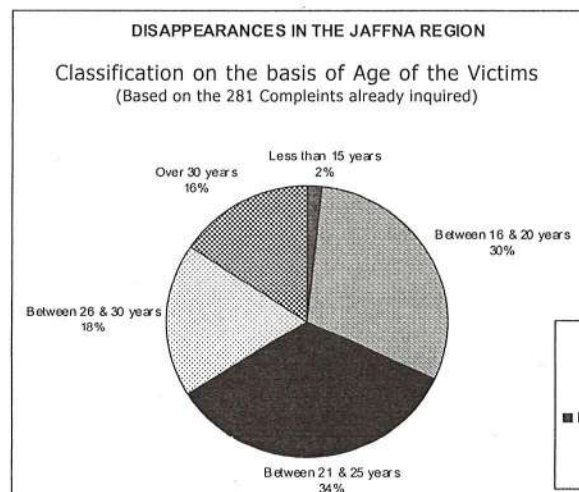
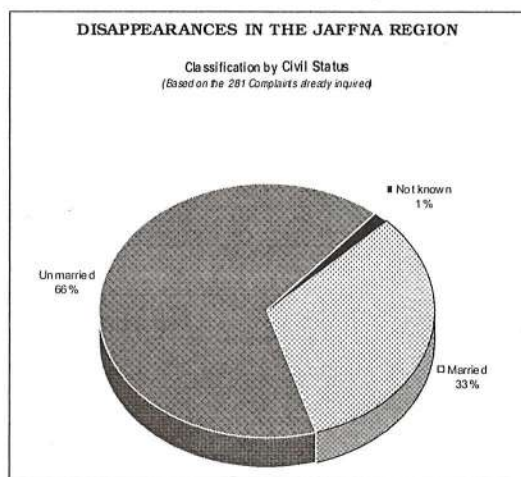
We do not find the reasons given for not being able to identify the army personnel concerned plausible. The failure of the Army to identify even one of the 37 persons in the list provided by us has driven us to suspect that this may be due to a mix of inefficiency, indifference and an unwillingness to co-operate for fear that incriminating evidence could be revealed.

The two army personnel who in service did meet us reported that most of the documents in Jaffna of the relevant period had been lost

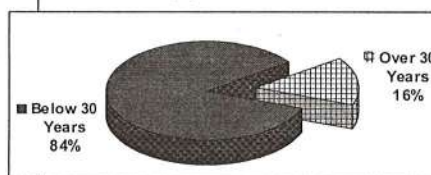
and provided very little useful information. One of them, Col. Duminda Keppetiwala, was directly implicated in many of the complaints relating to the disappeared. But he claimed that he remembered virtually nothing, in contrast to the complainants who had very clear memories of his involvement.

In the case of the LTTE there was only one person identified by the victims. He responded to our invitation to give evidence, but he too claimed that he could remember nothing. He agreed to consult the records and supply any available information from the list of Muslim victims in whose arrest he was implicated, on the basis of the evidence before us. But no such information was forthcoming, despite several reminders.

Our brief was limited to investigating the 281 disappearances in the list given to us by the Human Rights Commission, excluding 35 others who could not be reached and 09 others who repeatedly failed to respond to our summons. Of these 281, 256 were Tamils and 25 were Muslims. Of the 256



Tamils, it has been established that 02 were shot dead by the Army, 245 others were taken in by the Army and then disappeared, 01 was taken in by the Navy and then disappeared, 05 had disappeared with no trace as to the cause of their disappearance and, happily, the other three had returned to their homes after being in detention. 25 Muslims taken in by the LTTE had also disappeared.



In the cases assigned to us, 248 Tamils had either been killed by or disappeared after being taken in by the armed services, and 25 Muslims had either been killed by or disappeared after being taken in by LTTE. However this sample does not capture the full ethnic range of killings, disappearances and other political crimes in Sri Lanka. The protracted conflict has compromised several institutions and sections of our population, and there are victims and perpetrators among all ethnic groups, although the scale of such crimes may depend on the prevailing power structure at the relevant time in each locality. A consequence of the protracted civil war resulted in the brutalisation and corruption of state institutions responsible to protect the lives of citizens, instead went to the extent of being actively involved in the most terrible crimes against citizens, of liberation groups claiming to defend the population against oppression being involved in criminal oppression of sections of the population, and of very large numbers of otherwise decent human beings not only tolerating such activities but even justifying them as unavoidable and necessary in the circumstances.

Misappropriation of Personal Belongings and Criminal Motivations

In almost every case, when a person was taken away by service personnel, personal possessions such as wristlets, cash, jewellery, vehicles etc, also disappeared. Even if there were lawful reasons to arrest a person, it is surely unlawful to take over personal possessions. But such seems to have been the practice, and the hierarchy of the services seem to have tolerated it. This practice at least in several cases, suggests that, misappropriation of personal belongings could have been a motivating factor in effecting the arrests and causing the disappearances. In some cases those who had returned recently after employment abroad and could therefore be presumed to possess some wealth were victims of disappearance. A few examples of such cases are given below:

Wealth from employment overseas

Complt No : CHA/016

Victim : K. Pushparajah
Complainant : V. Kamala

There is evidence that the victim who returned after about 5 years in Saudi Arabia was arrested by the army at a round up on 19.07.1996 at Thatchanthoppu. The army officers were led by Duminda, the Officer in charge of the Navatkuli Camp. The search for him at the army camps in the area did not bear fruit. A Habeas Corpus case filed also did not help to trace him.

Victim : K. Ketheshwaran
Complainant : K. Manoharan

There is evidence that the victim had worked in Saudi Arabia for 14 years and returned. He was arrested by the army in round up with about 100 others on 19.07.96. Although 52 were taken to KKS, about 25 were released. Another 24, including a girl, were missing since then. The victim was among the 24 taken to Maheshwari Rice Mill and is still missing.

It was suggested that these persons were taken to avenge the death of a brother of Col. Duminda Keppetiwala during the attack on the Mullaitivu Army camp. Duminda was in charge of the Navatkuli Army camp which conducted the round up.

Misappropriation of Vehicles

Complt No : CHA/020

Victim : A. Kodeswaran
Complainant : K. Easwary

There is evidence that the victim had been arrested by the army and taken with his **motor cycle** on 04.08.1996, during a round up. He had gone to buy fish when this happened. His bike too is now missing. When the complainant went looking for him, Kodeswaran was found blindfolded in a house. His motorbike was outside the house. When Colonel Duminda who was there, was asked to release him, he had told the complainant that he would be released the following day after an inquiry.

About 2 weeks prior to the incident the victim had been a witness to an arrest of another person named Sellathurai Sivarasa. It is believed that this was a contributory reason for his arrest. The victim's younger brother Adiparameswaran was arrested on the same day but was released three days later. Another person arrested on that day was released nine days later. But the said victim and his motorcycle are still missing.

Victim : P. Selvanesan
Complainant : P. Rasasothy

There is evidence that on 29.08.96 when the victim and his family were watching TV, six persons dressed in army uniform, one of whom masked, had entered the house around 9 p.m. and taken him away. When the complainant went behind the group asking that her son be released, they had said that he would be returned after inquiry. He had been taken to Navanthurai Camp and detained there. The complainant identified one Rodrigo as an Officer at the Navanthurai Army Camp. All requests to the army to release the victim yielded no results.

On 15.09.96 Rodrigo had asked the complainant for victim's **motorcycle** and the connected documents. Through fear she had given those documents. Then the army had painted the bike green and used it for their work. Selvanesan had disappeared but not his motorbike.

Bicycle, Jewellery etc.

Complt No : CHA/129

Victim : Asirwatham Paraniya
Complainant : A. Punithawathy

There is evidence that the victim was taken by the army at Thattatheru Check Point on 20.06.96 when he went to Mailankadhu with his mother on a **bicycle**. He was **wearing a wristlet, rings, a bracelet and a chain**. The complainant said that the victim was taken to be used as a masked man to work with the army personnel at the sentry point. Inquiries at the Ministry of Defence as well as at the Chunnakam Police were of no avail. There is no news of the victim since then. His belongings were never returned.

Victim : T. Sivakumar
 Complainant : T. Maheshwary

There is evidence that the victim who visited the Army Civil Affairs office to arrange to sail to Trincomalee to proceed abroad was arrested on 01.07.96, blindfolded and taken away by the army with the knowledge of the police. His **bicycle** and **gold jewellery** also disappeared. The parents suspect that he may have been taken away for the bicycle and jewellery. Nothing was heard of him thereafter.

Victim : S. Satheshkumar
 Complainant : S. Umadevi

There is evidence that on 28.08.1996 the victim had gone to Chavakachcheri market on his bicycle to bring coconuts for the weekend. He was due to appear for the G.C.E. A/L examination on the same day. But he had not returned from Chavakachcheri and the parents had gone in search of him. Then the mother had seen the son's **bicycle** near the Nunavil Army Check Point. When she inquired from the army personnel about her son they had admitted arresting him and had indicated he would be released later. However nothing was heard of him thereafter.

Gold, Cash and Motor Cycle

Complt No : CHA/223

Victim : S. Vasantha Mohan
 Complainant : S. Vasanthakumar

There is evidence that the victim who was an undergraduate had gone on his motorbike on 28.08.96 to Jaffna to buy tyres for their lorry and flour for their bakery. He had taken along with him **Rs.25 000/=** for this purpose.

He had not returned that day. The parents went to Thinnaveli Army Camp the next day and inquired whether he was being detained there. The officers had denied any knowledge of the victim. But a girl from the University had informed the parents that she had seen the victim being taken at the army check point at the Kandarmadam Junction and being taken away with his motorbike in a van. His parents had checked at Irupalai and Punnalaikadduwan army camps. They could not find him.

Victim : V. Kannathasan
 Complainant : V. Nagammah

There is evidence that the victim who was a jeweller by profession, had on 26.08.1996 taken ten gold sovereigns of jewellery from Jaffna on his bicycle to Selva Jewellery shop in Chavakachcheri when he was arrested by the army. When he did not return, inquiries had been made around the place where he went missing. One Kanthar Selliah of Puttur, had seen the victim being arrested by the army. Inquiries from the army had not yielded any results. Kanthar Selliah is now dead.

At least in a few cases there seem to have been other motivations such as eliminating men to gain **access to women** or directly taking away women with the same objective, as perhaps in the following cases:

Victim : C. Concey
Complainant : M. Ritaamma

The complainant M. Ritaamma the mother of the victim and the victim's sister, S. Jansi gave evidence. According to the evidence, the victim Concey was 23 years then and had returned to Gurunagar from Mullaitivu on 30.10.95. Some time afterwards she was arrested by the army and was required to sign at the army camp every day. The army would also summon her to the camp from time to time. On 25.07.96 Concey's house had been surrounded by army personnel in civil clothes who took her away in a white hiring car. Another girl had also been arrested along with her and taken to the Gurunagar camp and later released. This girl had seen Consey in custody in the Gurunagar camp. Captain Dedigama was in charge of the camp. Nothing is known of her whereabouts since then. The other girl who was released, is not traceable.

Complt No : CHA/233

Victim : P. Kumudini
Complainant : P. Annaluxmy

There is evidence that on 28/03/97 complainant's son Paraneetharan had left home at about 2.00p.m. to play at Sittarnkerny and had not returned even by about 6 p.m. Complainant had gone to look for him. Several people she met told her that her son was taken away by the army.

At about 10.30 p.m. on that day several people dressed in army uniform and carrying arms had gone home and called for her daughter, the victim. Then she had been taken away. It appears that both the victim and the brother had been arrested by the army earlier and released. Habeas Corpus application No HCA41/01 had been filed by the complainant. She had been summoned several times by the Chief Magistrate's of Colombo to give evidence in this connection. But nothing had come out of it. There had been no information about the son and the daughter thereafter.

• • •

In a few other cases the arrests and disappearances seem to have been caused by army personnel being made use of by some local citizens to punish other local citizens on account of private disputes. Below are two examples of such cases:

Victim : V. Moorthy
Complainant : M. Veeraluxmy

There is evidence that the victim was a tea boutique owner and his newly married wife was an attendant at the Jaffna Hospital. He was on his way to his boutique when he was arrested in the presence of his wife on 01.07.96. Army personnel had informed the complainant that a shop owner had given some information regarding the victim to the army. Complainant suggests that the shop owner wanted to make the victim vacate from

his shop and therefore gave false information to the army to get rid of him. Several inquiries were made but all of them drew a blank.

Victim : K. Ramanan
Complainant : K. Parameshwary

It appears that the victim and another boy whose name is not known, had jointly rented a video cassette player. When the boy failed to pay his share of the rental of Rs. 300/= the victim had assaulted him in retaliation. This boy is said to have informed the army that the victim is an LTTEer.

This was alleged to be the reason for the army taking the victim away on 08.02.97 from his home. The victim is missing since then.

• • •

In some other cases, the motivation for arrests may not have been personal but casual, revealing a callous disregard for human life. For example, those with injuries seem to have been routinely picked up for disappearance on the suspicion that the victim could have been a battle scarred LTTE combatant:

Complainant : N. Varatharajan

There is evidence that the victim was arrested by the army on 08.08.1996 and again on 09.08.1996 and finally on 11.08.1996. He had **a scar on his nose** due to an operation that was performed on him when he was young. The father stated that they were getting on well with the army personnel in the camp in the neighbourhood until General Hapangama was killed at Stanley Road, Jaffna. The victim had been arrested without any reason. Nothing is known as to what happened to the victim thereafter.

Victim : K. Sivapunniyamoorthy
Complainant : S.P. Jayanthimalar

There is evidence that the victim was arrested by the army at Ariyalai on 05.09.1996 while he was out on business. One Kandasamy, a business colleague of his, had seen the incident but is scared to give evidence. He had been later transferred to Palaly by the army. It is believed that he had been taken because he did not carry his identity card which he had lost and also because **he had bandaged some wounds** on his legs. This may have led the Army to think that he was an injured LTTEer. The army had admitted he was in custody but he was never released thereafter.

In other cases, also indicative of a callous disregard for human life, the victims were not targeted for arrest but either stood in the way or were substitutes readily available for the person targeted for but who could not be found. These may include the following:

There is evidence that a well was being dug on 07.08.1996 in the premises of the complainant No. 1. S. Bhanumathy by five persons, viz. R. Sriskandarajah, R. Viknarajah, S. Jeyendran, K. Nagendran, A. Nagarasa. The army had come and arrested all of them. The complainant tried to intervene but could not stop the arrest. The complainant, together with the others connected, had visited these persons at the Kerudavil Army Camp. But on a subsequent visit they were told that those arrested persons had been transferred to Jaffna. They were also told that the Army was not really interested in these five persons, but had come looking for someone else whose name they did not divulge. There is no news of any of them since then.

Victim : **Vijayakumar Suthamalar**

Complainant : **A. Yogeswaran**

There is evidence that the victim's husband had a flat tyre and was wheeling his cycle through the Nunavil Junction while on his way to his mother's house on 06.06.1996, when the army arrested him and put him into a truck. The victim in this case, had refused to go unless they released him so they took her also along. Sirikantha, a fellow employee of her husband at the cycle shop informed the victim's father about the arrest. Their inquiries at the army camp were of no avail. Both the husband and wife are missing since then.

• • •

Another category of persons who disappeared were those whose services were required by the army. They had perhaps availed of their skills and later got rid of them as they could have acquired too much information about the set up in the camps. Here are a few examples:

Complt No : **CHA/153**

Victim : **D. Sureshkumar**

Complainant : **D. Bridget**

There is evidence that masked soldiers who came in the night on 20.07.96 had asked them to turn off the light. Then they asked for information about the LTTE which had been operating in that area earlier. They took the victim away to the Sinnakaday camp. A month afterwards, the arrest was confirmed by the officer in charge at the Sinnakaday

Camp who had told that the victim would be released in 2 years. A few months later the victim was seen being **used as an informer** in a roundup conducted by the army officer called Marikkar. The father had spotted his son, though he was masked, and identified him by a long birth mark on his right arm. In 1998 the father had again spotted him in an army truck. The father believes that the victim may have been used many times as a masked informer. He was never seen thereafter. The complainant Bridget, who is the mother and Joseph, who is the father of the victim, gave evidence.

Victim : T. Ranesh
Complainant : T. Saroja

Victim was a **motor mechanic** who had done small repairs for the army from time to time and was also known to Cpl Sampath Rajapakse. There is evidence that the victim went to Jaffna Town on 23/08/1996 in connection with his work, and was taken in by Cpl Sampath Rajapakse of the army. A girl, whose name is not known, had also informed the family that some persons dressed in uniforms similar to that of the army had taken away the victim. The victim had not been heard of since.

Complt No : CHA/226

Victim : I. Niruban
Complainant : I. Pooranam

There is evidence that on 28/01/97 at about 10.30 a.m. the complainant had seen some persons dressed in army type uniform trying to take away her son. They had removed his shorts, torn it into two and tied his hands using the torn pieces. He had then been taken to the Gajaba camp and kept for about 4 months. The arrest of the victim was also seen by one S. Rajathurai. She had learnt from some others later that the victim had been **made to do odd jobs** for the army. The complainant claims to have seen and identified the victim being taken around in a truck subsequently, dressed in army uniform and with his face covered by a mask. There is no further information about him since then.

Victim : R. Sasinthan
Complainant : E. Selvarani

There is evidence that the victim who was running a cycle repair shop in Manipay Market had been taken by the army on 6/7/97 along with another person called Ramanan. The information about the arrest had been given to the family by those in the market at the time who had seen the arrest. Ramanan had been released shortly afterwards.

The complainant believes that the victim was arrested by the Uduvil Army Camp personnel. She claims that on the same day of arrest the victim was brought to the Kovil by the army, dressed in uniform and with his face covered, **to serve as a masked informer**. She said that she could recognize her son by many external signs in spite of his face being covered and being put into an army uniform. The victim had not been heard of since

A recurrent statement by witnesses was that it was the disappeared victim who was already the leader and economic mainstay of the family or, though yet too young, clearly possessed such potential. We considered the possibility that many witnesses may have exaggerated the role of the disappeared, but could not escape the conclusion that, even allowing for some exaggeration, in very many cases such statements contained a core of truth.



Some members of the fishing community in Kovilakandy, Chavakachcheri. These women lost their husbands. The old man had lost his son and the other lost a brother. The children are fatherless. What does the future hold for them?

Why were those with such characteristics disproportionately selected for 'disappearance'? One reason could be that their skills and leadership qualities had been used by the 'enemy' for their ends, and the captors might have felt justified in punishing them. Another could be that such skills and leadership qualities marked them out as threatening to those who sought to subdue the family and local community.

A third reason could be that these persons were useful to provide a range of services (including, but not confined to intelligence work) to their captors, or for extortion purposes, but in the process of working with their captors over a period of time, they got to know too many secrets to be permitted to get back to their families and community.

Whatever the reasons, the elimination of the leaders and potential leaders has not only had particularly disastrous social and economic impact on the family and the community, but also undermined the capacity and potential for reconciliation and recovery. It is those capable of mobilizing and leading the family and community under the most unfavourable circumstances who may also be best equipped to pioneer reconciliation and recovery.

The Role of the Services

Most of the arrests of the disappeared Tamils were made by army personnel. In a few cases police personnel may have been present, but in most cases, we have no evidence of such presence. Col. Duminda Keppetiwala said that those arrested were routinely and promptly passed on to the custody of the police, but we have no evidence in support of this claim. In fact, S.P., Jaffna, who

gave evidence before us, said that he has no records pertaining to any of those on our lists of missing persons being handed over to police custody. In the absence of such evidence, it is the army that we hold responsible for the disappearances of those taken in by army personnel.

The police record in respect of disappearances in Jaffna is heavily marred by overwhelming evidence that they had initially refused to take down the statements by the complainants in respect of the arrests and, when they did belatedly record statements, they were nearly all in Sinhala (which none of the complainants understood) and, moreover, were badly and systematically distorted to avoid revealing the institutional identity of those making the arrests. In consequence, whilst most of these statements are of no use to either the complainants or to us in identifying the person or institution responsible for the arrests, they reveal police complicity, if not in the disappearance, at least in attempts to cover up. Having heard the evidence of hundreds of complainants and read the statements recorded by the police in Sinhalese that they had signed, we have no doubt that the distortion was deliberate.

The police hierarchy is also guilty in that they failed to provide facilities for statements from the public to be recorded in the language in which they were made. Complainants signing such distorted statements destroy their own case, and this seems to be what they were led to do at the police stations. The police hierarchy must take the responsibility for permitting this to happen.

An obvious remedy would have been to proceed to recruit and train an adequate number of Tamil speaking policemen and, in the meanwhile, to make interim arrangements where necessary for responsible Tamil speaking civilians to be hired to record statements in Tamil in police stations. Why was this not done?

The Role of LTTE

In the cases of disappearances of the 35 Muslims arrested by the LTTE only 25 were inquired into; 10 complainants could not be traced. We have adequate evidence of the arrest of the 25 but very little information on the circumstances or causes. The Jaffna political leader of the LTTE, Mr. Ilamparuthy alias Anchanyer, gave evidence before us and made a general statement that arrests

were made by the LTTE during the relevant period only for purposes of investigation and punishment of crimes. When asked about the 35 complaints regarding Muslims who had disappeared, he disclaimed any knowledge. The list of these 35 cases was given to him, and he undertook to check with their records and report.

But no reply has been received in spite of several reminders over the telephone and in writing. There was no response to our attempts to reach the LTTE hierarchy at the Political Headquarters in Kilinochchi to get information about these disappearances.

Having listened to the evidence of the Muslim complainants, we have no reason to suspect any personal motivation in the case of any of these arrests, but are left with no clue as to what the 'crime' referred to could have been in each case. Was it political (e.g. collaborating with army or providing independent leadership to the Muslim community), or financial (e.g. non-payment of taxes, or failing to submit to directives in respect of business transactions)? We have no evidence to come to any conclusion except to hold the LTTE responsible for the disappearance of each of these 25 Muslims, the complaints in respect of which evidence was heard by the Committee. Nothing could be said about the remaining 10 complaints regarding Muslims who disappeared as no evidence was available to the Committee.

We have faulted the police and the armed forces for institutional racism; we fault the LTTE too on this account for specially targeting Muslim leaders for arrest. The LTTE needs to urgently address its relationship with the Muslims.

What we have said about chain of command responsibility of those high up in the police and the armed services applies equally to the LTTE. Irrespective of who in the LTTE makes the arrests, those high up in the organization are responsible.

Some of the institutional reforms we have urged in respect of the services need to be adopted by the LTTE too. The families and the Human Rights Commission need to be kept informed of any person taken into custody, for whatever reason, and of the release of that person; the responsibility of the LTTE for the disappeared continues until the family and the Human Rights Commission gain access to that person.

Chapter III

Proceedings Regarding Those Responsible

"There can be no healing without peace; there can be no peace without justice; there can be no justice without respect for human rights and the rule of law"

Arrests, Detentions and Transfers

The relevant rules have been modified under the Emergency Regulations and the Prevention of Terrorism Act, but it appears that the rules have been flouted with impunity with devastating consequences. It appears that thousands of innocent persons could be arrested, indefinitely detained, tortured, raped and killed, and their bodies disposed of with no information provided to anyone and without any records being kept. Those directly involved in the unlawful detention, torture, rape, killings and disposal of the bodies bear responsibility, but so too do those complicit in any stage of these operations. Special responsibility lies with those at the apex of the command structure, who permitted this state of affairs to exist, whether or not they were directly involved in the activities listed above. It is important that, as recommended in the Report, "Officials with Chain of Command responsibility who order or tolerate "disappearances" by those under their command should incur themselves criminal liability invariably."

We strongly endorse the recommendations contained in Chapter V of the Report of the All Island Commission on Disappearances (annex X) and, in particular, the following –

1. All arrests, detention and transfers, must be immediately recorded by the arresting authority.
2. The nearest police station should be informed of all arrests and this information should be maintained in a register.
3. The Human Rights Commission should be informed within 48 hours, by the Officer-in-Charge of the Police Station or army camp, of all arrests made. The IGP should be required to compile and make available to the Human Rights Commission statistics of compliance.

4. The Divisional Secretary concerned should be informed, weekly, by the Officer-in-Charge of the Police Station or army camp, of all arrests made.
5. The duty to produce detainees before the Magistrate within 24 hours of the arrest should be enforced even in respect of any detention under any Emergency Regulations, and the Magistrate must be kept informed of any change in the place of custody or release.
6. The prescribed receipt of arrest is an essential preventive measure and must be issued to a family member or friend in all cases, with a copy given to the detainee.
7. The places of detention should be given due publicity in places such as the District Secretariat, the Divisional Secretariat, the Grama Niladharis' Office and Magistrate's Courts.
8. The Regulations regarding prompt handing over to the Police or to the prison authorities should be enforced.
9. The Magistrate should be required to visit authorized places of detention monthly and, in addition, any other alleged place of detention brought to his notice.
10. The Prison Rules, including the right of the detainee to communicate with the family and with legal counsel should be enforced, even in respect of those held under the Emergency Regulations.
11. Release from detention should be through the courts or to the families, with records kept of the acknowledgement given by the family member concerned. The Magistrate's Court and the Divisional Secretary must be informed of the release.

Punishment for failure to observe the rules

1. The failure to maintain records and observe the other rules in respect of detention should be a cognizable offence, and the police or security personnel concerned should be promptly prosecuted. There should also be provision for private complaints in such cases.
2. In addition to the prosecution referred to above, the police or security personnel concerned should be subject to disciplinary action. In the event of the superior officers failing to institute disciplinary action, they themselves should be subjected to disciplinary action.
3. The penalties for these offences should be severe and include entry in the service record, suspension, loss of promotion, termination of service etc. It is essential that the service record of an officer should include instances where the Supreme Court has found the officer to be guilty of breach of fundamental rights and responsibility in habeas corpus applications.

Those under investigation

We agree with the recommendation in the Report¹ that, "Such persons should be transferred out of the area of alleged incidents under investigations. Interdiction, however, should not take place until a disciplinary inquiry or a criminal prosecution is instituted. However if any alleged attempt is reported –

- to interfere with witnesses;
- threats to lawyers²;
- threats to petitioners and witnesses; and
- obstruct investigations;

we recommend that they should not only be the subject of a further inquiry followed by further punishment, but such complaints should be grounds for interdiction as being evidence of unchanged attitude and conduct."

Punishments

We endorse the recommendations in the Report that, "Imprisonment of individual perpetrators convicted by a Court of Law and consequent dismissal from service are possible already and should be the invariable practice with regard to this category of offenders Disciplinary action not only can, but must follow.

The absence of Disciplinary Inquiry at the Police Departmental level and Court Martial in respect of errant members of the security forces will have as its inevitable outcome, a sense of *de facto* impunity which, in turn, will give rise to a sense of resentment in the forces if and when discipline and accountability are re-asserted.

It is recommended that the allegations of unjust enrichment should be the subject of consideration at the trial so as to obviate the need for a multiplicity of actions. The liability to restore to the complainants any unjust enrichment and the award of compensation should be the part of a punishment, never a substitute."

The Report at page 20, contains several valuable recommendations, reproduced in annex 1, which we endorse.

We endorse the recommendation in the Report that it is imperative that police investigations be done in respect of all the findings collectively and not selectively on a case by case basis alone. This would also help to give families of victims re-assurance that investigations are being carried out as comprehensively as possible with a view to mete out justice impartially. A positive move is that some initiative has already been taken in response to the recommendations of the Presidential Commission of Inquiry into Disappearances. A Disappearances Investigation Unit (DIU) has been set up under the Deputy Inspector General of Police of the Criminal Investigation Department, it appears that a few cases have been taken up but that the progress is slow. It is necessary to empower the DIU to accomplish all its tasks thoroughly, comprehensively. We also endorse the recommendation to empower the Human Rights Commission to have a prosecuting arm in an independent Human Rights Prosecutor, and share the expectation that :

"It is hoped that the coming into existence of an office of an Independent Human Rights Prosecutor and the prosecutions initiated thereby will give rise to valuable jurisprudence on State liability for breach of human rights norms, in contradistinction to the outcome of proceedings in normal prosecutions as at present, which emphasizes the culpability of errant individual officials alone."

Amnesty for whistle blowing

This is a device that has been used extensively in other countries to extract confessions that may not otherwise be forthcoming. Confessions are particularly valuable if they provide essential evidence against those accomplices who may be unwilling to confess, or which help to throw light on the fate of victims in respect of whom vital information is lacking. On the other hand amnesties should not be too freely available - the benefit to the person confessing should not be so disproportionate to the value of the confession in furthering prosecutions that the victims feel cheated of justice. To qualify for amnesty, the confession should be clean and full, and should not shield either the immediate accomplices or those higher up the chain of command. In this connection we wish to reproduce, with our endorsement, from the report the submission of the Asian Human Rights Commission that:

"If disappearances had taken place in a particular area, the ASP in Charge, even if he had no direct hand in such disappearances, should be made liable for the action of his subordinates. The liability of the officers in charge of an area cannot be treated lightly."

In this connection it is curious to note that whereas it has been the practice in respect of other crimes to give reduced sentences, or even a full pardon in appropriate cases, to those whose confessions help to establish guilt, this does not appear to be the practice in cases of "crimes against humanity". Thus Corporal Somaratne Rajapakse, along with four others, are in the death

row for rape and murder, but they (albeit belatedly) blew the whistle on many others, against whom no action appears to have been taken, although their crimes are just as terrible.

Perhaps their fate might have been different if they blew the whistle earlier, in the course of their trial, but this is not certain. It does not appear that any attempt was made to induce them to whistle blow. In fact it could be argued that Corporal Rajapakse and the 4 others in the death row are likely to be denied any reduction in their punishment precisely because their whistle blowing is embarrassing and threatening the welfare of many senior service personnel.

This is not surprising. Alexis Leo de Silva, Superintendent in Charge of Welikada Prisons at the time of the prison massacres of the 25th and 27th July 1983 attempted to blow the whistle but was prevented from doing so by the Magistrate who held the inquest, the Commissioner General of Prisons, and those further up the hierarchy. Moreover, he was denied his increments and promotions.

In contrast, no action was taken against any of the officials involved in organizing the massacre or the prisoners involved in executing the ³. Fear of such retaliation may inhibit whistle blowing against unlawful and criminal activities of state and non-state actors.

Although we have no powers of enforcement or punishment, in Chapter III, we make recommendations regarding action to be taken against those responsible in one way or the other, for the disappearances. That indiscriminate killings, torture, rape and other abuses of civilians were taking place was public knowledge. That service personnel, camps and vehicles were engaged in those activities was also public knowledge. The scale of disappearances and other human rights abuses over the years has been such that the service institutions cannot disclaim responsibility. These were not stray instances resulting from the actions of a few errant service personnel but part of a definite pattern. These could not have taken place on such a scale without the complicity

of many at the middle levels of the hierarchy. At the higher levels if there was no direct complicity there was indifference and inefficiency in enforcing discipline, as well as complicity in the cover up.

What were the measures initiated to stop such abuses, to inquire into them, and to arrest and punish the guilty? How many arrests were made, how many were convicted and were the punishments meted out in keeping with the seriousness of the crimes such as murder, rape and torture? What precautions were taken to ensure that those who make the arrest do not misappropriate the property of those arrested? What measures were taken to ensure that the family was kept informed of the arrests and subsequent transfer or deaths, if any? What inducements were offered to elicit whistle blowing and what protection was offered to whistle blowers? All these could have been done effectively within the institution.

The evidence we have direct from many hundreds of eye-witnesses and immediate family members, constantly directs accusation not only against individual service personnel but also against the service institutions. Access to senior officers was severely restricted. Even the few who succeeded in reaching them seem to have had little or no success even in getting information about the disappeared. There was a Board of Investigation of Defence Ministry officials which would have had privileged access to service personnel at all levels.

But the entire exercise seems to have been aborted; the Report, if any, was not published nor is there recommendations of any significance that came out of the investigation. Having weighed the evidence, we have no option but to hold the service institutions responsible for the disappearances of 256* *Tamil persons*. This does not mean that special responsibility is not cast on particular individuals. Disciplinary action should be taken against them without any further delay.

In the case of those arrested by the LTTE we are equally ignorant of their fate. Since most of the Muslim complaints have been displaced to Puttalam we held a sitting in Puttalam and another in

Colombo to record their evidence. But information of the fate of the Muslim disappeared has been just as difficult to come by, as in the case of the Tamil disappearances. It is only in respect of the manner of arrests that there was a difference. The Muslim arrests were done openly and in public, whereas several of the army arrests were not. But thereafter the transparency ended.

In the circumstances we have no option but to hold the LTTE responsible for the disappearances of 25 Muslim persons we inquired into. The transparency ended as the families had no communication from the LTTE, neither was any relevant information provided to us, in spite of reminders.

We endorse the recommendation contained in the Report⁴, "to set up machinery by way of a Special Committee of Eminent Persons to entertain and record evidence and to recommend an amnesty to such witnesses from within the structures who, within a stated period, confessed to their own participation in the violations of the human right at issue and give full evidence in respect of the whole incident including orders received, planning for, etc. The provisions of the South African Truth Commission may be considered a model." But it may be necessary to go beyond offering amnesty to providing protection from extra-legal retaliation or punishment for whistle blowing and, even further, to giving adequate incentives for effective whistle blowing.

Chapter IV

Disclaiming of Responsibility and other Irregularities

An almost invariable pattern emerging from our inquiries is of denial of responsibility for the victim on the part of those who made the arrest, those to whom the victim was transferred, and all other service personnel involved, all the way up to the chain of command.

Blindfolding the victim

In most cases the victims appear to have been blindfolded before being taken away. Blindfolding prevents the victim from identifying the others being taken away, the route followed, the destination and the identity of the others detained there. Perhaps this was a precaution against information leaking out in the event of a victim securing release from custody. But if the arrests and detentions were lawful, what was the need for such precautions? The suspicion is inescapable that the entire exercise was planned and executed as an unlawful operation with an unlawful objective.

Night arrests by unidentified masked men

There is much evidence to suggest that a very large number of the arrests were made by service personnel who knew the victim, or by service personnel accompanied by masked informers who knew the victim. In several cases the arrests were made at night, often after ensuring that the lights were turned off; frequently even the service personnel were masked. In many of these cases the identity of those who made the arrest could not be established at the time of the arrest, and it was easy for those responsible to deny any hand in it. But even in such cases the responsibility of the local service unit for the arrest cannot be disclaimed.

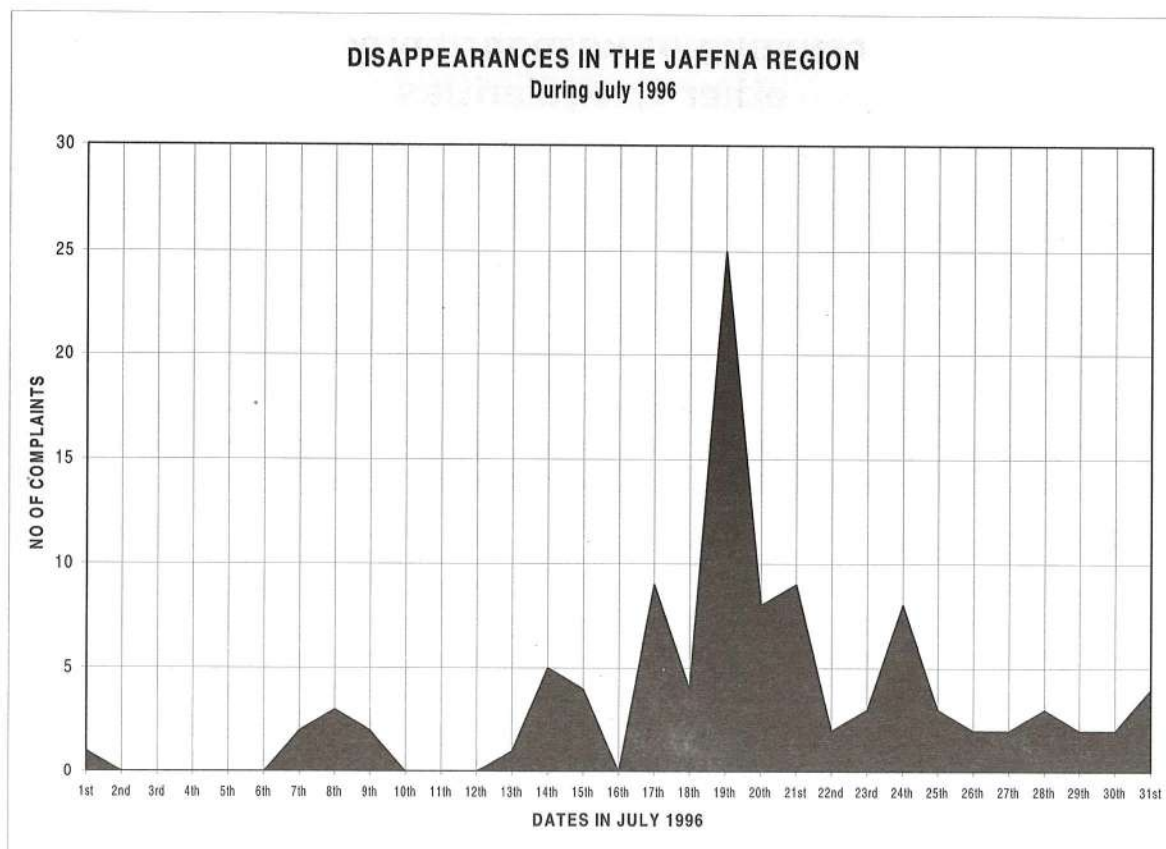
There were no militant groups that could move freely in that period, particularly during night curfew hours without the knowledge and backing of the armed services. In the environment and circumstances prevailing at that time, it is not plausible to suggest that any unauthorized group could have made the arrests without the collusion of the armed services, and any denial of responsibility by them is untenable.

But what was the need for those making the arrests to wear masks? This might have been either because the army personnel did not want to be identified or some of them were not regular army

personnel but members of other militant groups or other informants working with the army who did not want to be recognized. Particularly if there were service personnel who did not wish to be identified, it would raise suspicions that the operation was not intended to make lawful arrests but, rather, to effect disappearances. The fact that large numbers of those taken away have, in fact, disappeared suggests that this was so in many cases.

Arrests by identified service personnel

In very many cases the arrests were made in the presence of witnesses who could identify those who made the arrests. The witnesses may be family members, friends, colleagues or others who happened to be present at the time of the arrest. In these cases we have recorded the available evidence and, in many cases, more evidence could be recorded if necessary. In many other cases the arrests were made in public round-ups in the presence of virtually every adult in the neighborhood. In all these cases, the fact of the arrest and the fact that they were by service personnel, are unchallenged.



Even in cases where the identity of those who made the arrest was known, responsibility had been disclaimed. Either the fact of the arrest was denied altogether (notwithstanding the absurdity of such denials), or it was reported to those who sought information that the victim had been transferred to another camp and would soon be released, or that with such transfer those who made the arrest had lost track of the victim and had no further information to offer. It is possible that in some cases the individuals who made the arrest did not have the full information on the fate of the victim. But they remain responsible to provide information on who took over the custody and what they did with the victim.

But for the officer in charge of the camp, the degree of responsibility is much higher. The head of the unit arresting the victim cannot disclaim responsibility for their fate. Was the arrest lawful? Was it done in the prescribed manner with openness and transparency? Were family members informed? Was the prescribed "receipt" issued in respect of the arrest?

Was the victim retained in custody lawfully and not in excess of the prescribed time limit? If the victim was transferred to another unit, are there records of the transfer available? Were family members informed of the transfer? Were precautions taken to prevent detainees from being maltreated? The senior officers may or may not have known the answers to any or all of these questions in any or every case. But it was their responsibility to ensure that such irregularities did not flourish in institutions under their charge.

Disclaiming Responsibility

The evidence of Lt. Col. Duminda Keppetiwala, (whose name transpired in very many complaints) was interrogated by the Committee and his evidence was a total denial of any persons being arrested by him, in particular, or by the army, in general. The army "never arrests" he said. It is only the Police who make arrests, while the army provides the cordon for the search and roundups. "The military intelligence also arrests" he added, qualifying the earlier denial. The Committee summoned the Superintendent of Police, Jaffna who stated that they have records of all persons arrested by the Police. Such records were perused and the names of none of those who are alleged to have disappeared were found in the books of the police. In the absence of any supportive evidence the Committee is unable to accept the claim that all the arrests were either made by the police or that those arrested were promptly transferred to police custody.

When General Lohan Gunawardena, Chief of Staff of the Army who gave evidence before the Committee, was questioned about those arrested, he stated that only the records mentioned after 1997 are available, those prior to it having been lost or destroyed during the various attacks on army camps.

The records of the Kalutara Prison, where Tamil suspects are detained were also checked. None of the names of these disappeared persons were found in the lists provided. In the circumstances the Committee had no choice but to hold that though there is clear evidence in most of the complaints of disappearances inquired into that the person concerned was arrested or abducted by the security

forces personnel, there is none to indicate that they were released or detained somewhere or, indeed, that such persons are living.

Acknowledgement of Arrests

We did not find the suggestion that those who took away the victims were not responsible for their disappearances to be convincing. No evidence was forthcoming that the victims were lawfully handed over to the police or any other institution for custody or released. In the absence of any such evidence, the responsibility for the victims remains with those who took them.

It is conceivable that one or two of the Tamils alleged to have disappeared after being taken in by the armed services could have got out and either voluntarily or involuntarily joined the LTTE. But none of the evidence we have been able to gather suggests that this was so in any case before us; on the contrary, the fact that the families were yet searching for them and had reported them as missing suggests otherwise. If they had joined the LTTE, the families would have been motivated to keep silent rather than initiate an inquiry. Likewise, we have no reasons to believe that any of the Muslims taken in by LTTE were released. The inescapable conclusion is that, in most cases, they are yet in the custody of the respective institutions that made the arrests or, more likely, they are no longer living.

Besides in almost every case there is clear evidence of the arrests or abductions of Tamils having been made by the security forces personnel, be it at a check point, during round ups or cordon and search operations or other circumstances. There is also evidence of some of those who were arrested or abducted being seen in temporary detention centres such as a rice mill or a food store, blindfolded and with their hands and feet tied. In almost all such cases there had been no trace of the person after being taken away. In the case of the Muslims, the available evidence is of their arrest by LTTE; none of them have been seen since.

Many persons have seen arrested persons being kept in this mill.

A Recurrent Pattern is of Denial of Arrests

A In Case No: CHA/126, in contrast to most others, the family got to know of the arrest very quickly, went to the sentry point and saw the victim in custody. Those who saw him included the parents, the two brothers and the owner of the jewellery shop in which the victim worked. Of these five, the parents are dead, but the jewellery shop owner and the brothers are yet living and can give evidence. Thus any attempt to deny making the arrest can be effectively refuted.

According to the witnesses in that case, they were asked to come again later to fetch the brother but when they went back at 2 p.m., they were told that the victim had been released. When they insisted that the victim had not returned home, they were asked to return at 5 p.m. This may suggest that the fate of the victim was yet in the balance at that time.

When they went back at 5 p.m. the sentries had changed and the new sentries said that there was no record of any such arrest. The family continued to make inquiries, over subsequent weeks but got no information from the Army. A possible explanation for the denial of the arrest may be that it had been decided to effect the 'disappearance' of the victim.

The evidence of Ratnam Ganeshamorthy in Case No:CHA/036 also seems to confirm a familiar pattern of systematic deception. The army personnel had first told him that Sriharan, who was

arrested near a bridge, had been released and had gone home by bus. But when Ratnam Ganeshamoorthy had spotted him, bound and blind folded, under the bridge, he was released, but arrested again almost immediately afterwards, a 100 yards, away.

When Ratnam Ganeshamoorthy returned a while later to inquire, a similar story was told of the victim Sriharan having been released and gone either to his home or to his uncle's house. There was no uncle's house close by and he had not gone home but on this occasion Sriharan could not be spotted in the vicinity. When they inquired again the next day it was suggested that he may have runaway to join the Tigers. It is relevant to note that the victim was well built, dark complexioned, and had a scar on his back, perhaps fitting a profile of an LTTE cadre in the minds of the soldiers. It is possible that the fate of the victim was decided immediately after the 1st arrest. This appears to have been the case in many other instances too. If the victim was only going to be questioned, there would have been no need to deny the arrest or to mislead the family in anyway.

In passing it needs to be noted that the witness Ganeshamoorthy showed commendable concern for his employee, who was also his relative, to the extent of confronting the soldiers on three occasions and, in between the first and second confrontations, leaving his tractor with coconuts unattended and coming back. He had actually secured a temporary release but it had been clearly determined that Sriharan would not get away. Perhaps with the first arrest, as in many other cases, his fate was sealed. But there is also evidence of a pattern of a few among the immediate community showing their concern and attempting to protect those arrested even at some risk to themselves.

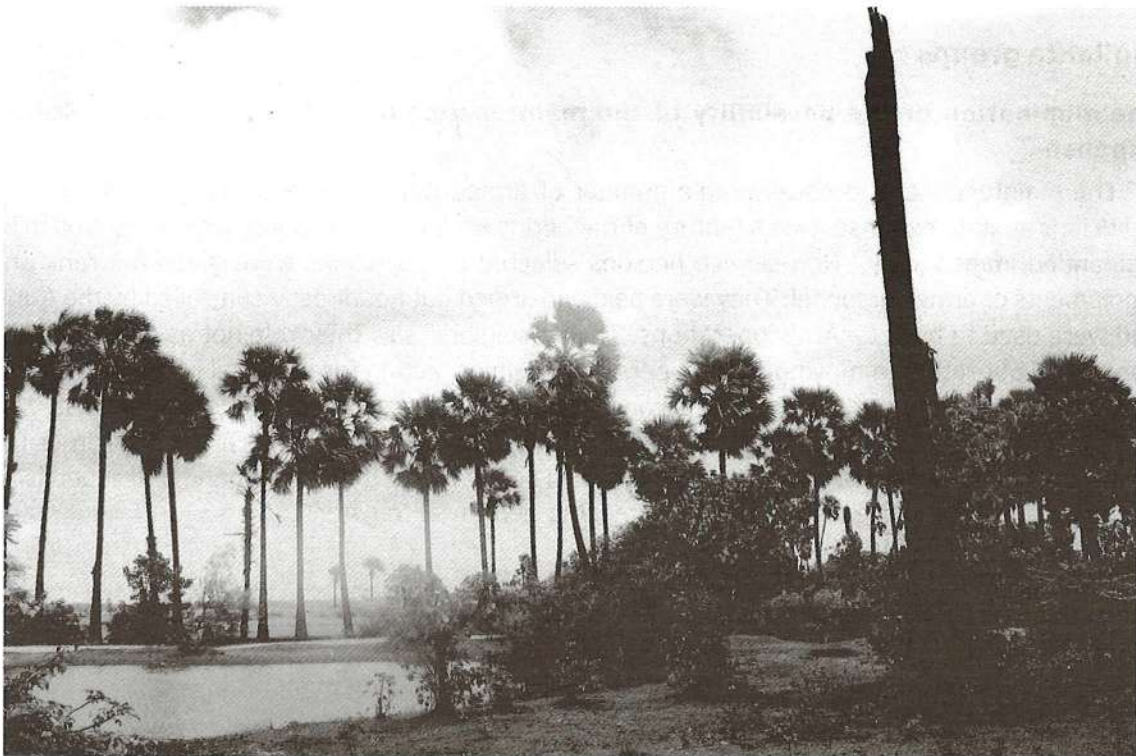
We note a persistent tendency to deny arrests. While in many cases arrest details are not known, in many several instances there are witnesses to the arrest, contradicting subsequent denials of the arrest on the part of the Army. In many cases the evidence of the arrest is amply supported, and the army would need to give an account of what they did with the arrested person. To say that records are not available is unacceptable.

Statements Recorded by the Police

In Case No:129 as in many others, we note that the statement to the Police was recorded in Sinhala and did not give all the essential details needed. In many cases even the details needed to link with the Police records were not there. In this case the Police had first refused to take down her statement and then taken it down in Sinhala but the details were significantly changed. According to the complainant the victim was taken away at the check point. But according to the copy of the statement recorded by the Police, the victim was arrested before the victim reached the check point by unidentified men wearing uniforms similar to that worn by the Army.

In contrast, in the evidence of the witness, the arrest was made at the check point. It appears that there had been a systematic and deliberate attempt by the Police, in this and in other cases, to avoid recording information that could incriminate the police or the army, or to distort the recording so as to facilitate disclaiming of responsibility.

Further, in their oral evidence given to us, many witnesses showed no doubt as to the institutional affiliation of those who took the victims away and, in several cases, of the identity of the individuals who made the arrests. In nearly all cases they identified the institution as the army and, in a few cases, as the police. In contrast, in the statements recorded in Sinhalese at the Police station it had been frequently recorded that those who took the victims away "were dressed in uniforms similar to those of the army". In some cases the Sinhala statements explicitly said that the witness could not say if those who took the victims away were army personnel. This is in contradiction to the oral evidence consistently given to us. Since nearly all the witnesses could neither read nor understand Sinhalese it seems likely that the statements as recorded may contain a systematically distorted version of what was said by the complainants and/or witnesses.

Chapter V

Preventive Measures

Vigilante groups

The elimination of the possibility of the maintenance of a 'Private Army' at State expense

"The maintenance of a considerable number of armed personnel as security guards etc. of politicians at state expense, was a feature of the period under consideration, which requires to be dismantled immediately." Non-service persons selected by politicians were given the rank and emoluments of army personnel. They were paid and armed but not directly controlled by the Army, and were used to back up Army operations. These "soldiers" saw their role not as protecting the population but rather in moving against personal enemies, acting for personal benefit or moving against the opponents of the politicians concerned. We endorse the recommendation that, "the security of public figures should be provided by a special security coordination division of the Police. Officers attached to this division who should be subjected to the command and supervision of superior officers in the service and be subject to periodical transfer."

A Police Lay-Visitors' Panel for each Police area

"It is necessary to re-establish community-based forces and procedures to which the citizens can turn when faced with the possible misuse of police powers, i.e. State power. Such community-based structures have an invaluable part to play in the areas of both monitoring and of preventing the misuse of power.

To serve this function we recommend a Panel of Lay-Visitors from each Police Station area, with powers to speak to detainees, to check conditions of detention to check records of police station in respect of detention, to liaise in the presentation of complaints to the police station, to liaise with the SSP/DIG of the area, to accompany to the police station when requested to do so, to make complaints themselves in a representative capacity, inclusive of impending problems. The coordination at local level with the Human Rights Commission could be an aspect of their work with importance for the restoration of Law and Order nationally."

A Citizen's Advisory Bureau

"A System of Citizens Advisory Bureau located in the vicinity of every Divisional Secretariat would be a valuable aid to the whole community for advice on various matters. In the context of disappearances specifically such a system is required for the assistance of bereaved persons as to where to go and what to do to obtain the requisite assistance.¹"

The lack of Tamil speaking personnel in the Police and the armed services is a major impediment to Tamil speaking persons interacting with the services. But an even more fundamental problem is alienation arising from the overwhelming Sinhalese bias in the ethnic composition of the services and, in particular, from the absence of Tamil service personnel. This bias and the resulting sense of mutual alienation has been building up for nearly half a century, and is a major component of the political problem underlying the ethnic conflict.

Other institutional reforms designed to prevent disappearances are urgently needed. It is suggested that when arrests are made, even under the PTA, the next of kin, the Human Rights

Commission and the local Magistrate should be routinely informed. The institution making the arrest assumes responsibility after informing the next of kin, the Human Rights Commission and the Magistrate and is responsible for the security of the person arrested unless and until any other institution to which the arrested person may be transferred.

If the arrested person is to be released, that should be done after notifying the next of kin, the Human Rights Commission and the Magistrate of the time and place of the release; if this is not done and the persons disappears, the institution that detained that person is responsible. Failure to keep the next of kin, the Human Rights Commission and the Magistrate informed should carry a very heavy penalty over and above any penalty imposed on account of any disappearance. These rules, including a directive by the President that an acknowledgement of arrest should be given to the next of kin, had often been observed in the breach. It is therefore necessary that violation of these requirements be recognized as a very serious breach of discipline warranting major punishment.

International Human Rights Obligations

These bind all actors including the police, the armed services and the LTTE. The ICRC has a special role in the implementation of human rights laws and regulations, which, all the parties referred to have flouted with impunity. We note that as far back as 28th November 1980, long before they overthrew the apartheid regime ANC president, Oliver Tambo, deposited the following declaration with the President of the ICRC.

"It is the conviction of the African National Congress of South Africa that international rules protecting the dignity of human beings must be upheld at all times. Therefore, and for humanitarian reasons, the African National Congress of South Africa hereby declares that, in the conduct of the struggle against apartheid and racism and for self-determination in South Africa, it intends to respect and be guided by the general principles of international humanitarian law applicable in armed conflicts."

The declaration goes on to refer to the four Geneva Conventions of 12 August 1949, and also to the 1977 additional Protocol 1, to which South Africa was then not a Party. We urge that the police, the armed services and the LTTE be required to submit to these Conventions and Protocols, to promptly notify the ICRC of all detentions, transfers and release, and also permit the ICRC to enter the camps, inspect detention centers and meet those detained.

Chapter VI

Relief to the Victims

One of the terms of the mandate of the Committee is to recommend any appropriate relief to the victims of disappearances. "Victims" of disappearances include the members of the family of, and others dependant on, the person who has disappeared. Many of them appeared before the Committee and lamented that they were in dire straits due to the disappearance of their dear one. In the circumstances the Committee endorses the comprehensive recommendations made by the four Presidential Commissions on Disappearances¹ with regard to relief to victims as encapsulated in the Final Report of the All Island Commission².

Many of the complainants who came before the Committee are eligible to receive monetary compensation under the government circulars on relief³. This will be dealt with in detail elsewhere in this chapter.

However unlike those complainants who went before the Presidential Commissions of Inquiry into Disappearances, those who complained to the Human Rights Commission and were referred to this Committee for inquiry, suffer a disability in getting such monetary relief. Whereas there is legal provision for the Registrar General as well as the authorities that deal with the payment of monetary compensation to recognise a certificate issued by a Presidential Commission on Disappearances confirming the disappearance of a person as empowering the Registrar General to issue a death certificate for the purpose of claiming compensation, certificates issued by this Committee on Disappearances may not be recognized as a legal document until the necessary changes are made in the law.

It is therefore recommended that the Human Rights Commission brings this anomaly to the notice of the authorities concerned and recommend that legislation be enacted to recognise the certificate issued by the Human Rights Commission's Committee of Inquiry into Disappearances as

a valid document to dispense with cumbersome procedures to be followed by a person to get a death certificate in respect of a disappeared person.

This brings us to the other question of the relevant law that facilitated the issue of a death certificate in such cases until the end of year 2000. The relevant page of the Report of the All Island Commission on Disappearances, on the issue of death certificates⁴ is quoted below:

"The administrative procedures for the issue of death certificates on the basis of disappearances were set up originally by the Registration of Deaths Act No: 2 of 1995. Certain shortcomings of such procedures were corrected by Act No:58 of 1998. Consequently

- Applicants who are now not living in their earlier places of residence, such as displaced persons, could apply direct to the Registrar General or the District Registrar of the last place of residence.
- The ground for issue of a death certificate is the expiration of one year after disappearance and the belief of the next of kin that he is no longer alive.

Section 2 reads as follows:-

'Where any person is reported missing and presumed to be dead as he has not been heard of for a period exceeding one year by those who would naturally have heard of him had he been alive, a next of kin of such person believed to be dead may apply in the manner hereinafter provided to register the death of such person'

It should be noted that the applicant has to be a next of kin. The burden thereafter is on the Registrar General to get the others to move to issue the death certificate.

- The Registrar General or the District Registrar has the responsibility of *taking a decision with regard to the under mentioned.*

"The application together with the evidence in support of the application and the objections, if any, and the evidence in support of such objections, and after such inquiry as he may deem necessary, if satisfied as to the truth of the matters stated in the application, allow such application."⁵

- Where a Presidential Commission of Inquiry has issued a certificate of a finding of disappearance it empowers the District Registrar to forward the application for a death certificate to the Registrar General and the Registrar General to issue a certificate of death without further inquiry.

Independent of the above procedure and as a part of the Civil Law, procedures are available to get the death certificate by an order of Court. However, this is a lengthy procedure."

This Act which was valid only for one year had lapsed in year 2000 and has not been renewed as was done in the previous years. Consequently the complainants who came before this Committee will not be able to get the benefit of that particular Act unless it is re-enacted with the suggested amendment.

As has already been stated, this Committee inquired into 25 of the 35 complaints in respect of Muslims who had disappeared from Jaffna during the relevant period. All those complainants are now living outside the Jaffna Region in a state of displacement. They will have to face a special problem when they apply for the monetary compensation to which they are entitled under the existing circulars. This is so because all the procedures that have to be followed in obtaining the compensation revolves round the Divisional Secretary's office of the area in which they originally lived. Having been displaced from their homes and living in various parts of the country outside the Jaffna peninsula, such persons should not be required to make the several trips that they may have to make to comply with the procedures in existence.

Even in the case of Tamil complainants, a few may be now resident outside Jaffna.

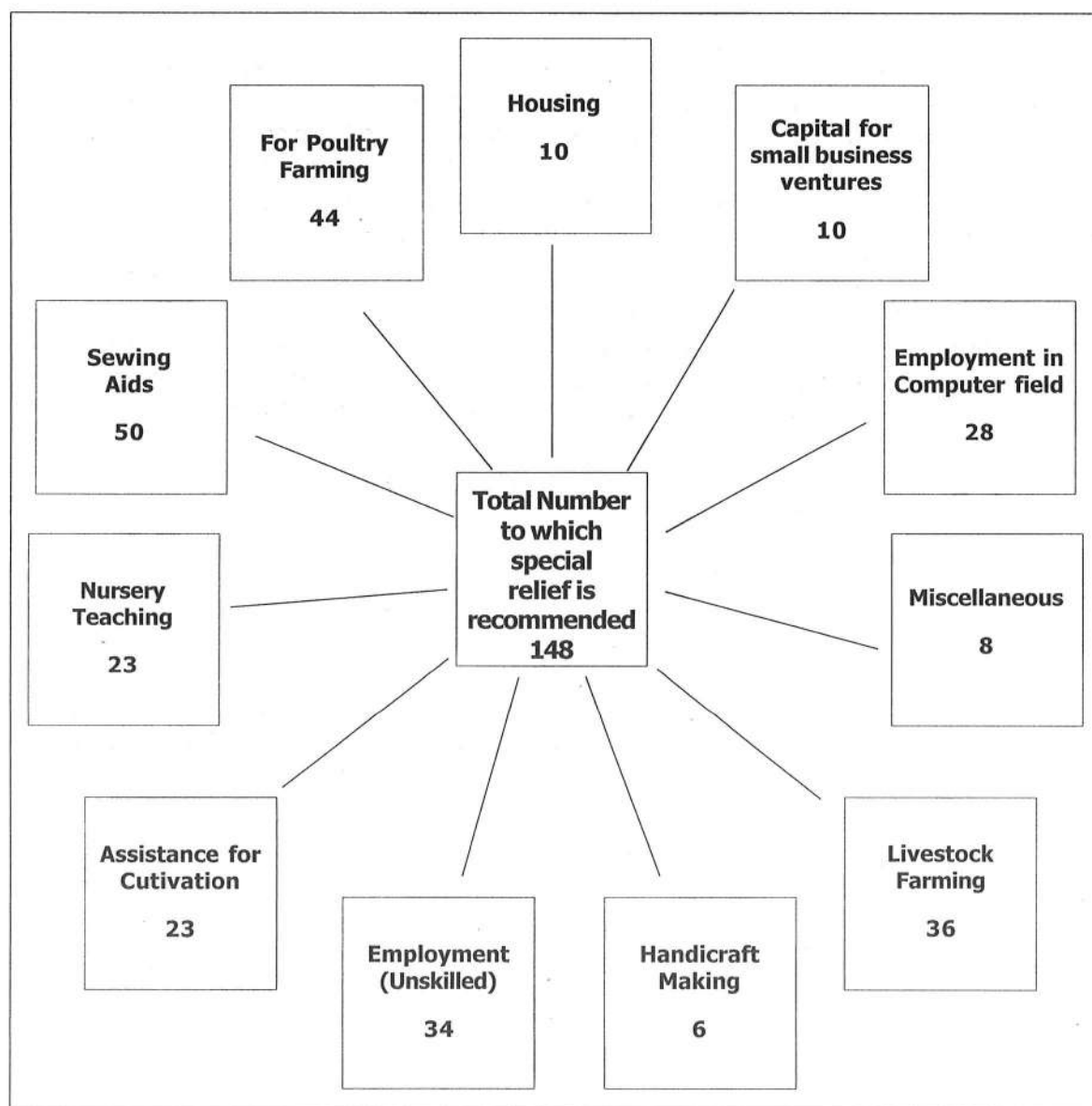

It is therefore recommended that the government should issue the necessary instructions to the Divisional Secretaries of the areas where the applicants now live, to accept and process applications for compensation in respect of disappeared persons, irrespective of their original places of residence.⁶ This would facilitate these applicants in obtaining the necessary documents and seeking the monetary compensation they are entitled to. The Committee had to be very discreet in identifying, on the basis of the evidence given, those to whom a special recommendation for relief is appropriate. A questionnaire was sent to such persons and, using the data so collected, the Committee identified 148 complainants who appeared before it to be in dire socio-economic circumstances.

The Committee made an effort to provide assistance in some way or other to these families by making the data collected available to NGOs that could do so. Some wanted assistance to educate the children in the families of the victim, others to secure implements of trade to indulge in some self-employment activity, etc. Their requirements are graphically depicted below:

This is a picture of a bereft grandmother, mother, daughter and grand daughter. With the disappearance of the breadwinner who was the eldest son of the family and the consequent death of the father, the family is in dire straits. They now live in irreducible poverty and despair.

To make the assistance sought meaningful and to make the beneficiary gets a sustainable income from whatever is provided – be it equipment or skills, it is very necessary that they be provided with training in the relevant field. With this end in view, this Committee has already contacted the UNHCR, the Women's Research and Action Front, and the Consortium of Human Rights Agencies, and has had discussions with the relevant officers in these institutions.

They were also provided with the list of persons to whom relief had been recommended. It is hoped that other organisations too would take note of these recommendations and see if they too could help – especially in providing training in the respective vocations. A request was also made to the Internally Displaced Persons Project of the Human Rights Commission to see if some funds from that project could be allocated to help these persons as nearly all of them have been internally displaced too.

There are several government circulars that deal with relief to victims of disappeared persons. As stated earlier, complainants who went before the Disappearances Commission are entitled to monetary compensation on the basis of circular No: M/R of R/UAS/MAP/I issued by the Ministry of Rehabilitation and Reconstruction on 26/09/1988 (vide copy of circular in annexed)⁸.

By Public Administration Circular No: 59/89 of 30/11/1989 heirs of all disappeared public officers including casual employees, daily paid employees, corporation employees, employees of co-operative societies and other semi-government institutions are entitled to receive the last drawn salary of the disappeared person till the time that the disappeared person would have reached 55 years (which is the optional date of retirement) and, in addition to that, a sum of Rupees one hundred and fifty thousand as compensation (vide copy of circular annexed)⁹.

A man who was well and able now reduced to despair and apathy he has lost all desire to work. The woman is confused and bewildered but has to carry on. This visual is illustrative of the many victims who have no coping mechanism to deal with the situation. Many were depressed, some committed suicide while others just faded away. Though the wife is the stronger partner both husband and wife need medical and psychological intervention and community support.



A mother with three children whose father has disappeared. There were many courageous women but they needed a reprieve from suffering. She is determined to get on with life but who will help her? The state or society or both? She needs hard cash as well as marketable skills. The family needs to be brought back into life with food, clothing and housing; these would not be mere 'handouts' but vital requirements for survival.

However, the Committee came across several cases where the disappeared persons had been employees of either state or semi-state institutions but the heirs are not aware of the circular which entitled them to receive the salary and compensation in that manner.

In every case where the victim was not aware of this facility to get the salary of the disappeared person, if he was a state or semi-state employee, the Committee drew the attention of the respective head of the institution and initiated the process for the payment of the salary and the compensation. Here again the stumbling block is the absence of a death certificate, which in any case could only be obtained if the Registration of Death (Temporary Provisions) Act¹⁰ which has since lapsed, is re-enacted (as already suggested) with the necessary amendment to include a certificate confirming disappearance of the victim is issued by the Human Rights Commission's Committee of Inquiry into on Disappearances.

It will be a valid document to register a disappeared person as 'presumed dead'.

However the Committee came across a few cases where the Local Head of the Education Department had authorised the payment of the salaries of the deceased state employees (teachers) to the spouses on a certificate from the Grama Sevaka countersigned by the Divisional Secretary of the area confirming the disappearance of the victims. Examples of a few such cases are given below.

Complt. No : CHA/006

Victim : G. Ganeshalingam
Complainant : G. Sivamathi

There is evidence that the victim was a Brahmin who had been taken away from his temple adjoining his house on 25/05/1996 while performing religious duties. He had just

returned from school where he was a teacher. Those who took him were army personnel in civil attire who later got down from their vehicles and took him away after getting into their uniforms. The entire neighbourhood witnessed the arrest. Nothing is known of his whereabouts thereafter.

The complainant is getting the salary of her husband from the Education Department on certificate issued by the AGA confirming the victim's disappearance.

Complt. No : CHA/055

Victim : A. Sriskaran
Complainant : S. Pathmini

The victim had been a teacher. There is evidence that he had been arrested by the army while he was at home on 10.08.96.

The army had come looking for the complainants' sister's husband, who was away in the Vanni. All the attempts to trace him in the army camps of the area had been of no use. However, the complainant produced a page of a newspaper called Namnadu dated 26.10.2000 where a picture of several persons in custody said to be taken at the Bindunuwewa Rehabilitation Camp appears. Investigations were made by the Committee to check on the authenticity of his photograph, without success.

The complainant is in receipt of the salary of her husband on a certificate issued by the AGA confirming the disappearance of the victim.

Complt. No : CHA/059

Victim : S. Vivekanandan
Complainant : V. Premalatha

The victim was a teacher. There is evidence that he had been taken from his home on 10.08.96 on being identified by a masked man who came with the army and called for "Vive Master". Though attempts were made to find him, he could not be found. Complainant produced a copy of a photograph that is said to have been published in a Tamil newspaper called "Namnadu" of 26.10.2000 where she believes her husband's picture is among those shown in the picture as persons in custody at the Bindhunuwewa Rehabilitation Camp. The Committee made attempts to check on the authenticity of this photograph, without success.

The complainant is in receipt of the salary of the husband from the date he disappeared, on a certificate issued by the AGA.

• • •

It is suggested that a recommendation be made to those concerned that a certificate issued by the Committee of Inquiry into Disappearances of the Human Rights Commission too be accepted as a valid document on which at least the salary of the state or semi-state employee could be paid, while the payment of the lump sum compensation could perhaps await the issue of the death certificate following the procedures laid down.

Whatever the circumstances may be, compensating the victims of disappearances is the responsibility of the State. Every effort must be made to lighten the burden on the victims as quickly as possible.

Socio-Economic Conditions of the Families of the Disappeared

A large majority of those who gave evidence before us regarding their disappeared family members seemed to be not only depressed but also in need of social and economic rehabilitation. Many appeared to be in dire poverty, i.e. well below minimum economic standards. The war caused extensive loss of property and income, aggravated by the practice of appropriating the personal possessions with the victims at the time of arrest, such as wristlet, gold jewellery (often of considerable value) and also the vehicle used by the victim (mostly a bicycle, but in some cases a motor bicycle, a car, or tractor). Frequently it was the disappeared who had been the mainstay of the family economy. With the loss of the breadwinner, those remaining were often compelled to sell any property they may have had to make ends meet. Thus what little capital the families had, ranging from jewellery, vehicle, livestock, farming equipment, houses, shops, trees and even land may have been lost. In many cases the sad consequences include the gradual demoralization of the individual and the social disintegration of the family and the community.

(Based on the 281 complaints inquired)

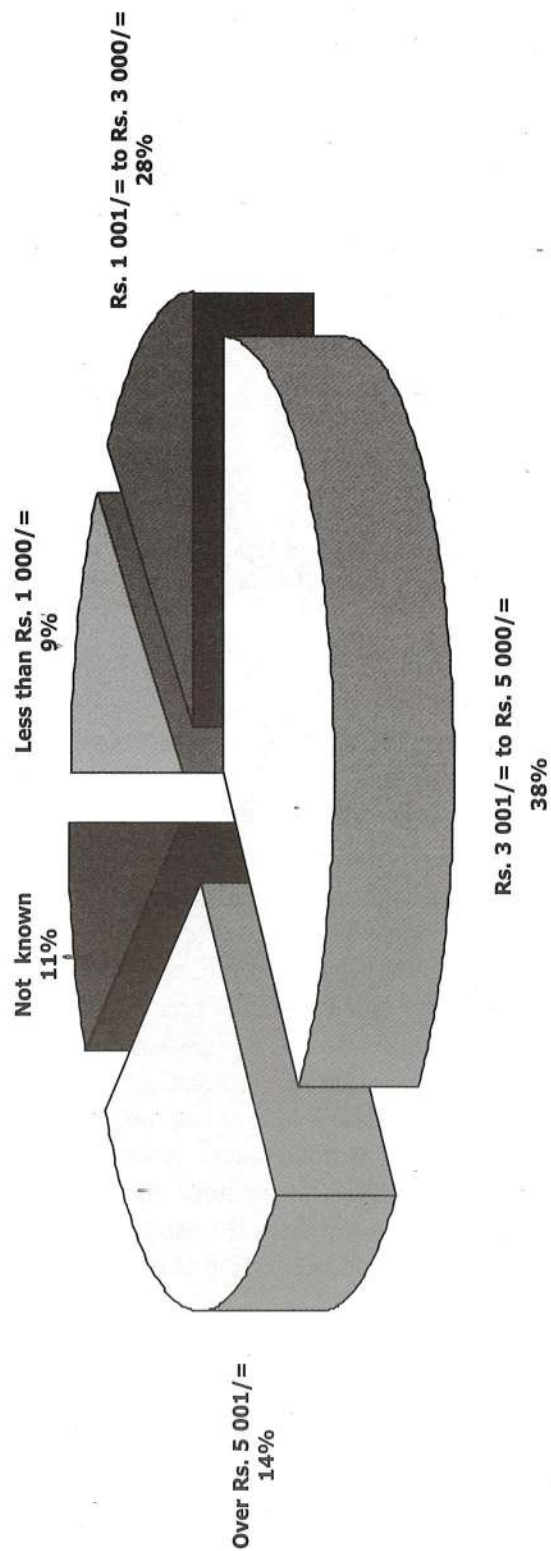
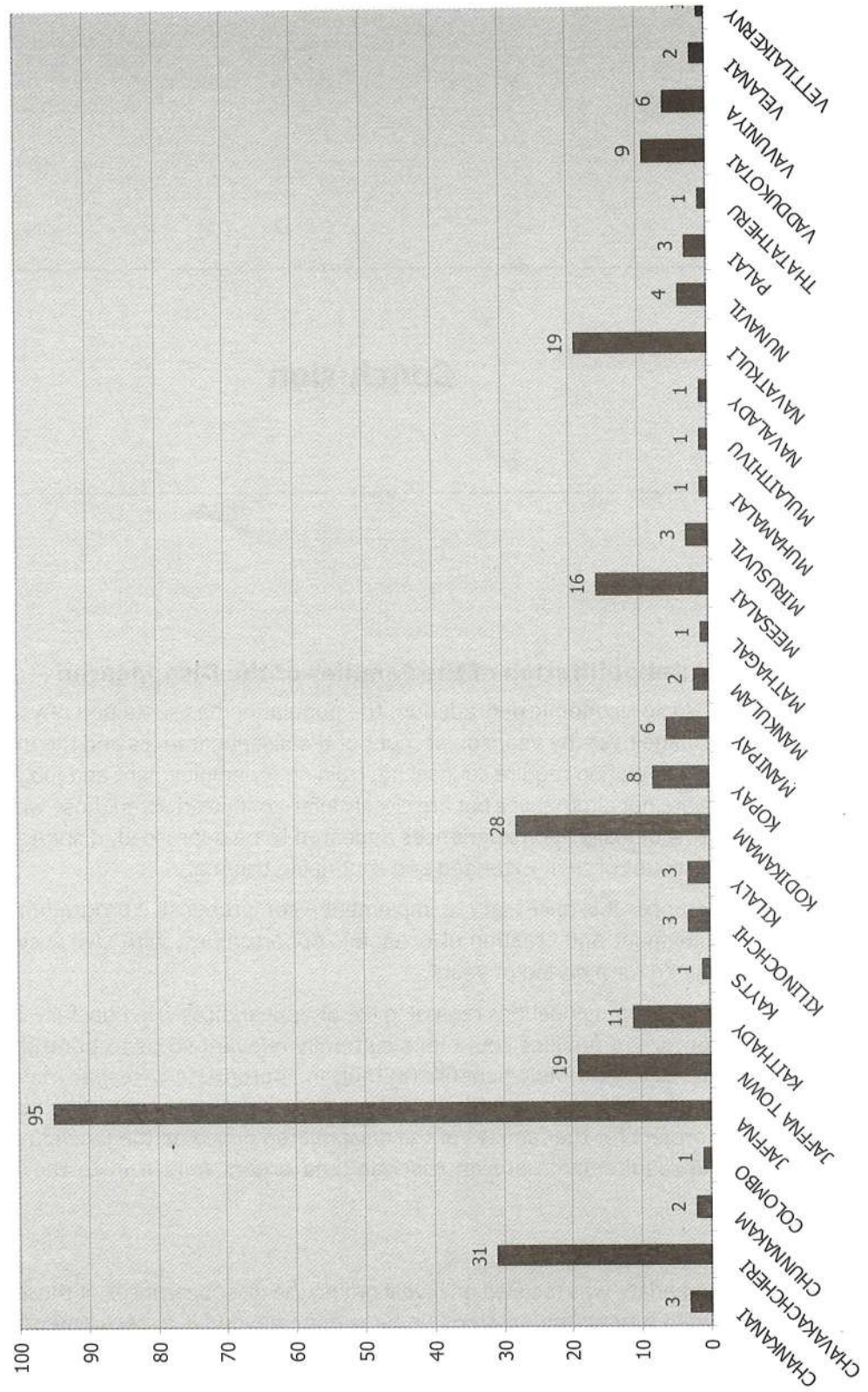

Chapter VII

Conclusion

Psychological Rehabilitation of the Families of the Disappeared

In addition to socio-economic degradation, the population has sustained physical, mental and psychological damage over the years on account of the disappearances and the experiences since then. Many in the population require counseling, training for employment and job opportunities. In most cases these are not alternatives but are closely inter-connected. Even those who are potentially productive in terms of skills and experiences appeared to be depressed, dispirited and unable to earn a living on account of their extended and continuing trauma.

In the circumstances it is necessary to implement a comprehensive programme of counseling, training for employment and creation of economic opportunities, with civil society support and monitoring sustained for a period of years.

Our findings and recommendations regarding the disappearances will, hopefully, have therapeutic value (in that concerned families could take culturally relevant steps to bring their trauma to a close), as well as socio-economic benefits (in that, in appropriate cases, any compensation and death benefits could be claimed and steps taken for socio-economic rehabilitation). Such a comprehensive project for the families of the disappeared based on the individual circumstances and their special requirements are an essential and urgent follow-up to the inquiry into the disappearance.

National Reconciliation

Although our mandate was focused on investigating the disappearances of those in the list given to us by the Human Rights Commission, we have gone beyond it to recommend preventive and remedial measures, and even further to suggest measures to promote National Unity and Reconciliation. There can be no enduring and comprehensive reconstruction, physical or social, economic or political, local or national, without reconciliation; and there can be no true reconciliation without all sections of the population collectively examining, diagnosing and working out remedies to eliminate the cancer that has eaten into our society.



An extended family says 'Namaskaram'. They do have a message. Perhaps this is what they want to convey "To enable us to get on with our lives, tell us whether they are dead or alive, so that we may perform the rites and rituals for their souls to rest in peace. Support us not merely to survive but to live.

This exercise could be led by a post-conflict Truth and Reconciliation Commission established with an appropriate mandate. Such a process would be time bound, but its prescription could include the institution of commemorative processes and memorials to help us to address the causes and consequences, and to prevent the recurrence of those ills. These could cover an annual programme of Remembrance and Reconciliation of the pogrom of the last week of July 1983, as well as memorials of collective mourning and reconciliation at the sites of the Jaffna Public Library (set fire to on 31 May 1981), and the ethnic violence / massacres at Anuradhapura (August 1977), Jaffna (23 & 24 July 1983), Kent and Dollar Farms (November 1984), Murunkan (04 December 1984), Valvettithurai Public Library (09 March 1985), Akkaraipattu (May 1985), Anuradhapura (14 May 1985), Pullumalai, (November 1986), Kokkatticholai (January, 1987), Aranthalawa, (February, 1987), Aranthalawa, (June, 1987) Kituloothuwa (14 April 1987), Pettah (April 1987), Jaffna Hospital (21 October 1987), Valvettithurai (02 August 1989), Rufuskulam, Thirukkivil (11 June 1990), Veeramunai Pillaiyar Temple Refugee Camp (12 July 1990), Kurukkal Madam (12 July 1990), Kaththankudy Mosque (03 August 1990), Eravur Mosque (12 August 1990), Eastern University (05 September 1990), Sathurukondan (09 September 1990), Mailanthanai (09 August 1992), St. James Church Refugee Camp, Jaffna (November 1993), Navali RC Church (09 July 1995), Nagarkovil (21 September 1995), Ampara (October 1995), Central Bank (January 1996), Kilivetti (11 February 1996), Jaffna (July & August 1996), Jaffna (January 1997), Gonagala (September 1999) and Katunayake International Airport (July 2001).

The above are some of the major incidents of attacks on civilian targets and killings of non-combatants. There are also several battle sites, which mark the death of large numbers of combatants, from the Sri Lankan armed services and the LTTE. But it is premature to decide on the manner in which these deaths and disasters should be commemorated. This can be done only after peace is established and the proposed Truth and Reconciliation Commission sets out its proposals. All that can be said at this stage is that these and many other tragedies need to be addressed on an

all island basis with a view to healing and reconciliation, without prejudice to any steps that may be taken to secure justice. There should be no blanket amnesty. Rather, a balance needs to be struck between what Bishop Tutu, in his foreword to the report of the South African Truth Commission, referred to as 'retributive and punitive justice' and 'restorative justice which is concerned not so much with punishment as with correcting imbalances, restoring broken relationships, healing, harmony and with reconciliation'.

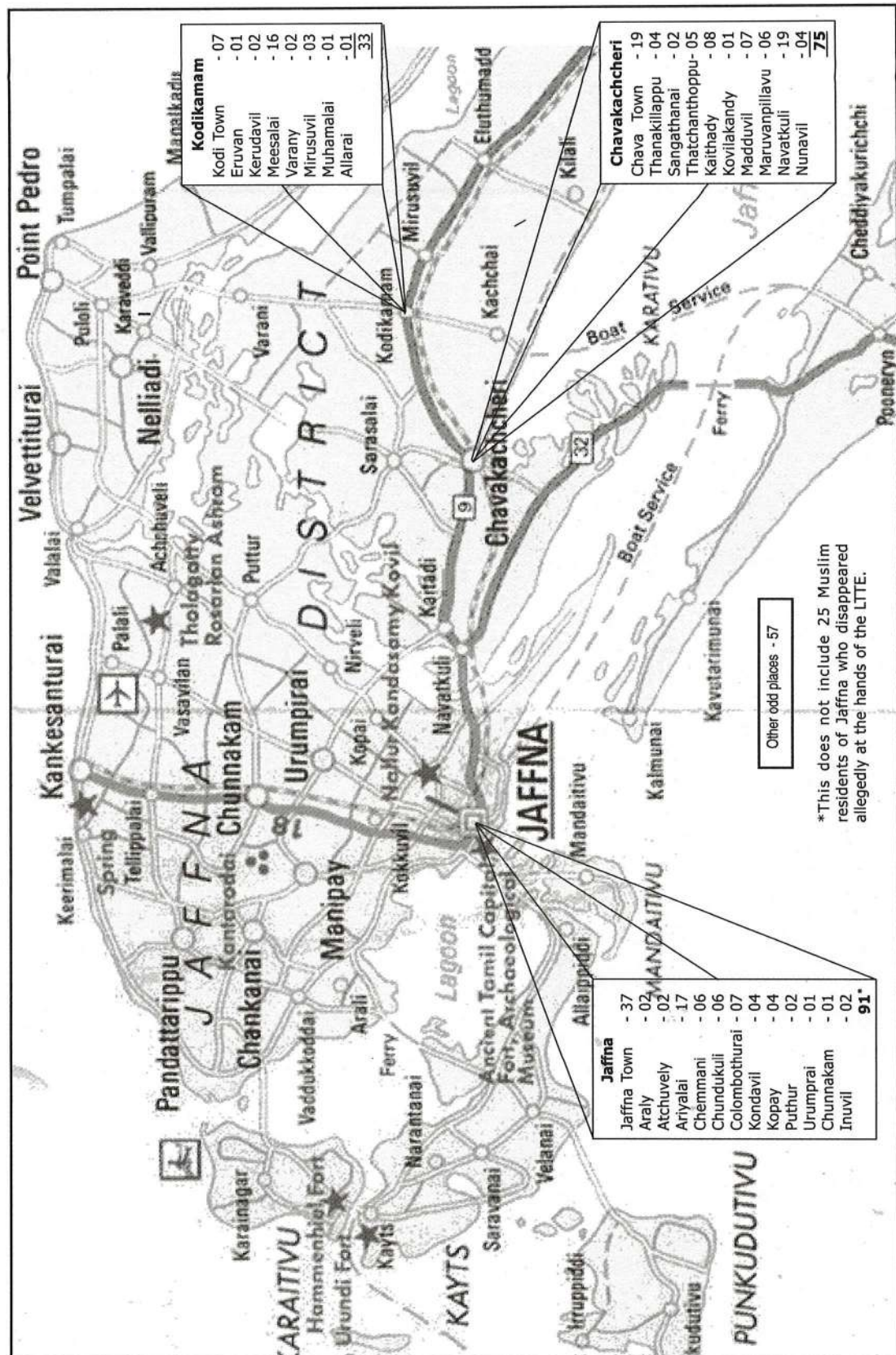

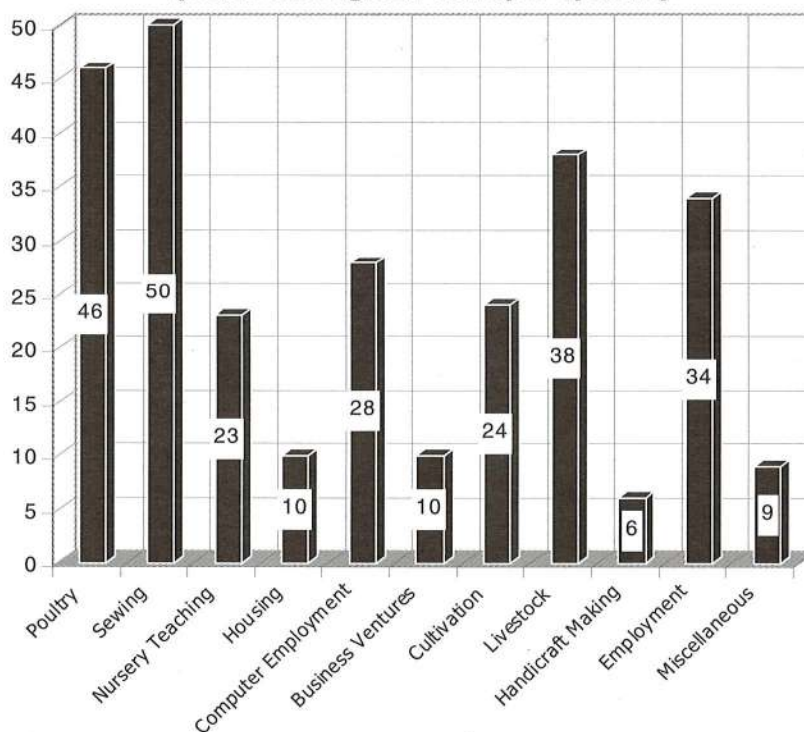

**Committee on Disappearances and Missing Persons of the
Human Rights Commission**
- Interim Report -

The Committee on Disappearances and Missing Persons in the Jaffna Region was appointed in December 2002 by the Human Rights Commission in terms of the provisions of section 11 (b) of the Human Rights Commission Act No: 21 of 1996. It consists of Dr. Devanesan Nesiah (Chairman), Mr. K.H. Camillus Fernando and Mrs. Jezima Ismail. The Terms of Reference (TOR) of the Committee were set out in the letter of appointment, a copy of which is at annex I.

The Committee had meetings in December, 2002 with the Chairman and some of the Members of the Human Rights Commission and had a briefing of the task it had been assigned. It was indicated that the Committee had been set up as a component of the Capacity Building Project for the promotion and protection of Human Rights in the Jaffna Region and that the National Coordinator of that Project would attend to the duties of the Secretary of the Committee, until the Committee finds one.

The Complaints of Disappearances and Missing Persons were analysed and processed prior to the commencement of the sessions of the Committee to inquire into them. (vide a statement of the analysis of the cases, at annex II).

A preliminary inquiry into the complaints to be looked into at the 1st Session of the Committee was conducted from the 8th to the 11th of January, 2003 at Jaffna and Chavakacheri. This was done by a team of investigating officers under the supervision of the officer attending to the duties of the Secretary to the Committee. Subsequently 66 complaints were listed for inquiry during the 1st Sessions of the Committee held from the 24th to the 26th of January, 2003 at Jaffna and Chavakacheri. There were 13 absentees at these sessions.

The Secretary of the Association of Guardians & Parents of those Arrested and Disappeared in the North appeared before the Committee during its first sessions and requested that complainants produced by him be inquired into instead of the Committee summoning such persons from the list provided. This request was not acceded to but the Committee gave an assurance that all those in the list of 232 already given to the Human Rights Commission by the Association would be summoned by the Committee for inquiry and their complaints would be heard and inquired.

The Secretary then wanted a further list be included for inquiry along with those in the list already before the Committee. The Committee pointed out that the Committee is authorized to inquire only into the complaints already given to the Human Rights Commission and that any additions to it could only be made by the HRC. He was asked forward new lists or complaints, if any, to the HRC and was told that if such complaints were also given to this Committee by the HRC with an extension of the Terms of Reference, those too would be dealt with by this Committee. The number of complaints currently before the Committee is 299 (an increase of 67 on the initial 232)

In the course of the inquiries during these sessions, many witnesses repeatedly referred to certain localities, buildings and institutions. Some of these were mentioned as sites of losses of lives and properties and others as places of arrests and detentions. There were also other localities, buildings and institutions closely associated with the disappearances of those in respect of which evidence was to be recorded subsequently. The Committee visited several of these localities and buildings to gain a clearer understanding of the background and events described in the evidence recorded. These visits proved to be very useful. A list of the localities and buildings visited is at annex III

The 2nd Session of the Committee was held in Jaffna and Kodigamam from the 28th of February to 2nd March, 2003. During these sessions 38 complaints were listed for inquiry of which 11 were absent

At the 3rd Session on 17th March 2003 at Puttalam the complaints of Muslims who are said to have disappeared at the hands of the LTTE were inquired into. 25 of the 35 summoned for inquiry were present during this session.

The 4th Session scheduled for the 29th to 31st March had to be cancelled in the last minute on account of the Lionair flights during this period being suddenly cancelled and the plane was grounded due to engine trouble. However, the investigating officers who had already travelled to Jaffna with the relevant files were instructed to go ahead with the preliminary inquiries and inform the complainants of the circumstances under which the Committee could not attend these sessions. Further inquiries into these complaints by the Committee is now scheduled for the 4 days commencing 15th April, 2003 when the 5th Session of the Committee is to be held.

During these sessions, the absentees at previous sessions were summoned once more to enable them to appear before the Committee. The complaints of those who absented themselves even on the second occasion have been laid by.

About 75 complaints are to be listed for inquiries during the 5th Session in April. By then a total of 180 of the 299 complaints would have been inquired into leaving a balance of 119 complaints which the Committee is hoping to dispose of during May, 2003.

The Committee has already heard the evidence of one Army Officer whose name had repeatedly transpired in the course of the investigations and is making an effort to meet other such personnel. The Senior Superintendent of Police in charge of Jaffna and a lawyer who had filed a large number of Habeas Corpus applications in respect of many of those who disappeared during this period, were also summoned and their evidence recorded. More such persons are to be examined before the final report of the Committee is prepared. It is also proposed to seek the assistance of the authorities concerned to access the LTTE in connection with the disappearances of the Muslims, evidence in respect of which was recorded at Puttalam.

In accordance with the mandate given by the Human Rights Commission, the focus of the Commission has been on uncovering, to the extent possible, the circumstances of the disappearances, the present condition and whereabouts of the disappeared and the identification of those responsible and, further, on recommending appropriate relief to the concerned families.

COMMITTEE TO INQUIRE INTO DISAPPEARANCES & MISSING PERSONS IN THE JAFFNA REGION (AMENDED LETTER OF APPOINTMENT)

The Human Rights Commission of Sri Lanka is currently engaged in a special effort directed towards the protection and promotion of human rights in the Jaffna region for the strengthening of the ongoing peace process. As part of this programme the Commission has decided to appoint a Committee under section 11 b of the Human Rights Commission of Sri Lanka to inquire into the complaints it has received regarding disappearances and removal of persons from their residences in the Jaffna, Kilinochchi and Vavuniya, Districts during the period 1990-1998.

The Commission is pleased to appoint you, as a member of the Committee. The other members of the Committee are Ms. Jezima Ismail, and Mr. K.H.C. Fernando.

You are appointed as the Chairman of the Committee. The Committee is required to inquire into and report on the following matters:

- Whether the persons in the annexed list provided by the Guardians' Association of those Arrested and Disappeared from the North, The Displaced North Muslims Organisation, and the complaints pertaining to this period received by the Regional Office of the Human Rights Commission in Jaffna as per letter dated 5th December, 2002 sent by the Regional Coordinator, Jaffna, have been involuntarily removed or have disappeared from their places of residence during the period mentioned by the complainants;
- All the circumstances pertaining to the alleged involuntary removals or disappearances;
- The present condition and whereabouts of the persons alleged to have been so removed or to have so disappeared;
- Reports made by complainants that the missing persons are being held in unidentified prisons & places of detention
- The evidence available for identifying the person or persons responsible for these alleged disappearances and the findings based on such evidence.
- The relief if any that should be provided to parents spouses and dependents of the persons alleged to have been removed or to have disappeared.

In conducting its proceedings the Committee should maintain a high degree of transparency, enable the complainants to participate as appropriate in the search for evidence and information pertaining to all the circumstances of the disappearances and should keep the complainants informed of the progress made as the inquiry proceeds.

If in the course of its inquiries the Committee deals with cases of complainants, particularly women and children who are in severely distressed circumstances and who may be in need of special care and support, the Committee should report such cases to the Commission for special relief.

For the purpose of enabling the Committee to conduct its investigations and perform its functions the Commission delegates to the Committee the relevant powers of investigation the Commission exercises under part 2 of the Act and in particular sections 18, 19 and 21.

- Ariyalai - saw the damaged buildings on either side of the Kandy Road.

Annex VII

Extract from the Final Report of Presidential Commission on Disappearances – Page 20

The Right to Civil Proceedings where there is a Court finding

Where a person has been found responsible in a Court of Law for abduction or wrongful confinement and where it transpired that the disappearance of the victim has ensued, **we recommend that a right be recognised in the dependants of the disappeared person to institute civil proceedings for the recovery of losses suffered by reason of such disappearance.** The right of the dependent should arise with no distinction whether the Courts finding was in a Fundamental Rights case or a Habeas Corpus application.

Institution of Applications for Fundamental Rights Violation

As the Constitution presently stands, a dependant of an "involuntarily removed and disappeared" corpus would not be able to invoke the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court under the Fundamental Rights Chapter in respect of the violation of the fundamental rights of that disappeared person. We accordingly **recommend** amendments to *Article 17 and 126* of the Constitution⁹ **enlarging the scope of locus standi** in Fundamental Rights applications.

Specially in the case of the returned detainees, we recommend that, they be permitted to make applications, despite the lapse of time, in terms of Article 11 and/or Article 13 of the Constitution through the Legal Advisory Services Bureau proposed in chapter IV.

Although the time limits contemplated in Article 126(2) of the Constitution have been interpreted liberally by the Supreme Court **a special response to cater for the problem of the returned detainees** by way of a Constitutional amendment is merited.

Habeas Corpus Applications

This Commission was struck by the volume of Habeas Corpus applications filed in respect of disappeared persons in the period under review. This fact goes to **underline the necessity that this remedy be made procedurally speedy and uncomplicated as well as being inexpensive.** We have dealt with this subject at length in the chapter on Preventive Measures.¹⁰

Implementation of Recommendations

A non-implementation or a lack of speed of implementation of the recommendations on Legal Proceedings by the three Disappearances Commissions¹¹ would understandably be a cause of anxiety to the human rights activist as well as to complainants themselves.¹² We adopt the recommendations of the earlier Commissions and stress the need for swift action in respect of those recommendations, and the need to create an office of an Independent Prosecutor¹³ whether as a structurally distinct unit or as part of the Human Rights Commission.

Annex VIII

Preventive Measures

The objectives of the recommendations set out below are:

- **The restoration of mutual confidence amongst citizens inter-se, and between citizens and the State.**
- **The strengthening of the underpinnings of a just and democratic society**

We are mindful that our recommendations should have relevance and be meaningful to citizens living in all parts of Sri Lanka. Priority must be given at all times to avoidance of situations of disappearances arising. The security forces and the police are necessary adjuncts of a State. They are required for the protection of the state and the protection of the citizens of the State. The average citizen looks to them for protection. The tragedy of Sri Lanka lies in the distortion of relationships between the citizens and the security forces including police, which has resulted from the acts of both politicians and subversives.

The paragraphs following will consider the changes required, whether by way of changes to existing institutions and procedures or by way of the establishment of new institutions and procedures, for the realisation of the objectives as rightly identified in the Southern Commission Report quoted above.

I. Provisions relating to Arrest, Detention and Transfer

The following recommendations shall be applicable to ALL arrests, detention and transfers, irrespective of whether they take place under the usual provisions of law or the extraordinary provisions under the Emergency Regulations and the Prevention of Terrorism Act.

1. **The Duty to Record Arrests, Detentions and Transfers :-** All arrests, detention and transfers must be recorded, in the books of the arresting authority immediately with the event.
2. **The Duty to Inform :-** The security forces including the police must inform the nearest **police station** forthwith of all arrests made by them. There shall be a concomitant duty on each police station to maintain a register of such notifications. **The information to be recorded at the Police station must contain the following particulars:**
 - i. Name of informant and other particulars of Rank, Regiment, and Army camp/Police station.
 - ii. Time and date when the information was received.
 - iii. Full particulars of the transaction informed i.e. place, time, purpose, etc.
 - iv. Name and address of relatives as supplied by detainees.

Information to Divisional Secretary :- Additionally there should be a duty cast on Officers-in-Charge of the Police Station or the Army Camp which was the arresting authority to submit to the Divisional Secretary weekly a list of persons arrested, detained or being transferred with particulars including such person's permanent address. There shall be concomitant duty on the Divisional Secretary to maintain a register of such information received which will be available to relations, lawyers or other persons/organisations with a legitimate interest in such information.

Duty to inform the Human Rights Commission

Her Excellency the President has already issued a directive to Heads of Armed Forces and the Police Force.¹

"to enable the **Human Rights Commission** of Sri Lanka (herein after referred to as 'the HRC') to exercise and perform its powers, functions and duties and for the purpose of ensuring that fundamental rights of persons arrested or detained are respected and such persons are treated humanely"

Section 6 (ii) of the Presidential Directive is as follows –

"Every officer who makes an arrest or order of detention as the case may be, shall forthwith, and in any case not later than forty-eight hours from the time of such arrest or detention, inform the HRC or any person specially authorized by the HRC, of such arrest or detention as the case may be, and the place at which the person so arrested or detained is being held in custody or detention."

However, the penalty for non-compliance with this directive is unclear and statistics of compliance are unavailable. **This Commission accordingly recommends that the penalty for non-compliance should be clearly specified and that it should cover Chain-of-Command Responsibility, in respect of non-compliance and that the IGP be required to compile and make available to the Human Rights Commission statistics of compliance.**

3. **The Duty to produce before the Magistrate within 24 hours :-** The requirement that all persons taken into custody be produced before the Magistrate within 24 hours, which was a long-standing salutary feature of law, was rendered inoperative during this period concerned in respect of the many persons in detention under Emergency Regulations and the Prevention of Terrorism Act, with many adverse consequences, some of which have been examined by the Supreme Court in the exercise of its fundamental rights jurisdiction. **The 24 hour rule should be re-introduced without delay. Additionally,** the Magistrate must continue to be kept informed of any change in the place of custody, transfer out of the Magistrate's jurisdiction, and release.

The Magistrates Court shall maintain a written record of such information, which will be available for perusal at the Magistrate's Courts.

4. **The duty to issue a Receipt of Arrest :-** The arresting officer must give at the time of arrest to a family member or friend of the person arrested, a Receipt of Arrest. This receipt must contain the name of the person arrested, date, place, officer arresting with rank and place of intended detention. A copy of this Receipt of Arrest is to be given in writing to the detainee himself.

5. Detention

Place of Detention :- "I looked for him all over the country" was a familiar statement in the evidence of the many petitioners before the Commission. **We welcome the fact that detention is required to be only at a place which is designated by the relevant authority to be "an authorised place¹" of detention.**

It is recommended:

- i. **That adequate publicity be given of the authorised places of detention²:**
 - (a) At a central regional office eg. The Government Agent's office or the Kachcheri.
 - (b) Through public display at the Magistrate's Courts, the Divisional Secretary's offices and the Grama Niladharis offices concerned.
- ii. **That the regulation should include the requirement of prompt handing-over to the custodial authorities:**
 - (a) That members of armed forces hand over persons arrested by them to the officer in charge of the nearest Police Station and
 - (b) Custody of the persons under arrest be handed over to the prison authorities as soon as possible and this be on a valid detention order. The task of the prison authorities is detention, independent of any investigation process that may be involved.

(a) and (b) above **shall apply equally to a change of place of detention.**

iii. **The Magistrate be required to visit alleged places of detention brought to his notice.**³

6. Visits by Magistrate of places of detention :- This Commission recommended the Magistrate be required to visit all places of detention once a month. A record of the Magistrate's monthly visit and comments, if any, and of any special visit made by the Magistrate pursuant to his Habeas Corpus Jurisdiction as proposed in this report, must be maintained at the places of detention as a record available for perusal by lawyers, Court, and persons or organisations with legitimate interest in the information.⁴

7. Conditions of Detention :- The Prison Rules should apply, including the right to communicate with the detainee's family and with legal counsel as stipulated in U.N. Standard Minimum Rules for the Treatment of Prisoners.

It is recommended that :

(a) The **Prison Rules** are made applicable to the detention of persons under the Emergency Regulations, **including the right of the detainee to communicate with the family with legal counsel as stipulated in UN Standard Minimum Rules for the Treatment of Prisoners.**⁵

(b) That the detainee **be produced before the Magistrate within 24 hours** of the arrest, even if it is necessary to be returned to police custody for investigations.⁶ This system is prevalent in Japan today.⁷

8. Release :- Release from detention must be

- i. Through Courts or
- ii. To the families.

When release is to the family, a family member must sign the record of release. The Magistrate's Court and the Divisional Secretary must be informed, including particulars of the person to whom the detainee was released.

II. The effect of a failure to abide by Rules regarding Arrest / Detention / Transfer

"We checked everywhere, the Police, the Army, the ICRC, the Presidential mobile Secretariat" was another familiar statement before the Commission. While Presidential Directives specify clearly that every member of the armed forces and of the police force shall ensure that fundamental rights of the persons arrested or detained are respected and the present Emergency Regulations provide a procedure for dealing with a non-adherence of the Regulations, **it is vital that the State itself is seen to be alert to the preservation of these rights by way of an institution of action in respect of alleged violators.**

1. A Criminal Prosecution :- The **failure** or refusal on the part of the Police to record arrests, detentions and transfers by the police and security forces, and to record complaints of abductions **if followed by an involuntary disappearance**, should be declared **a cognizable offense** by Act of Parliament. A criminal prosecution shall take place without delay.⁸

2. **A Right of Private Plaint :-** The failure to record arrests, detentions and transfers coupled with the refusal to record complaints of involuntary removals or disappearances as it happened in the period under review lie at the root of the phenomenon under consideration. It is a frontal attack at this root that requires attention. **We accordingly recommend that the failure or refusal per se to perform the rules envisaged above be declared to be acts entailing penal consequences, with, a right to file a private plaint in a virtual complainant, whether an individual or a representative institution, in the event of the police failing to institute proceedings.** The recognition of an institution as having *locus standi* to institute proceedings may serve to translate into practical terms the concept of the community concern in respect of the failure on the part of state agencies on whom public trust has been reposed.
3. **A Disciplinary Inquiry :-** A failure to abide by the Regulations without more should make the officer concerned subject to a disciplinary inquiry which shall be conducted by an inquiring officer from outside the service to which the alleged defaulter belongs. An absence of Disciplinary Inquiry for breaches of these Regulations was a feature of the era under consideration which, regrettably, continues and must be addressed. **It is the duty of superior officers to control subordinates and ultimately create a culture of accountability in the security forces. It follows that superiors should themselves be subject to disciplinary action for a non-performance of this Duty.**
4. **In – Service consequences of non- adherence to Regulations :-** That penalties of suspension, termination of the service, loss of promotional rights and other **disciplinary measures should invariably ensue from a finding of the disciplinary inquiry that the officer has violated the Regulations, is the best corrective factor for the prevention of abuses.**⁹
5. **Entry in Service Record –** This is **required for the success of any assertion of the principle of accountability whether at the level of the individual or at the level of the Chain-of-Command.** As at present, neither a finding of the Supreme Court that an Officer is in breach of the fundamental rights of a citizen, nor a finding of responsibility against an Officer in a Habeas Corpus Application, is entered in his Service Record. This, coupled with the absence of Disciplinary Inquires into alleged breaches of Regulation in this field, have resulted in several instances of promotions taking place without due attention being given to these incidents of proven abuse and breach of regulations.

The resultant twin consequences are a disenchantment on the part of the general public in the institutions of the police and security forces (as opposed to the individual officer), alongside the growth of a tendency on the part of the members of the police and security forces to view the attempted re-assertion of the principle of accountability as a political ploy of playing-to-the-masses.

In instances of judicial review of administrative action by the Supreme Court in complaints of transfer and non-promotion by Officers, the absence from Service Records of such crucially relevant particulars can well result in undue weightage accruing to the petitioner-officer's allegation of political discrimination. Moreover, more than one instance has been brought to our attention of the Print Media, misled by alleged particulars given in a petitioner-officer's Petition to Court, in its turn misleading the General Public.

We accordingly **recommend**

- i The **Service Record of an Officer should include** instances where the Supreme Court has found the Officer to be in **breach of Fundamental Rights**, and a finding of **responsibility in Habeas Corpus Applications.**
- ii That the **failure to abide by these regulations** when proved shall be entered in the officer's service record.

III. Speedy Action based on the findings of the Disappearances Commissions

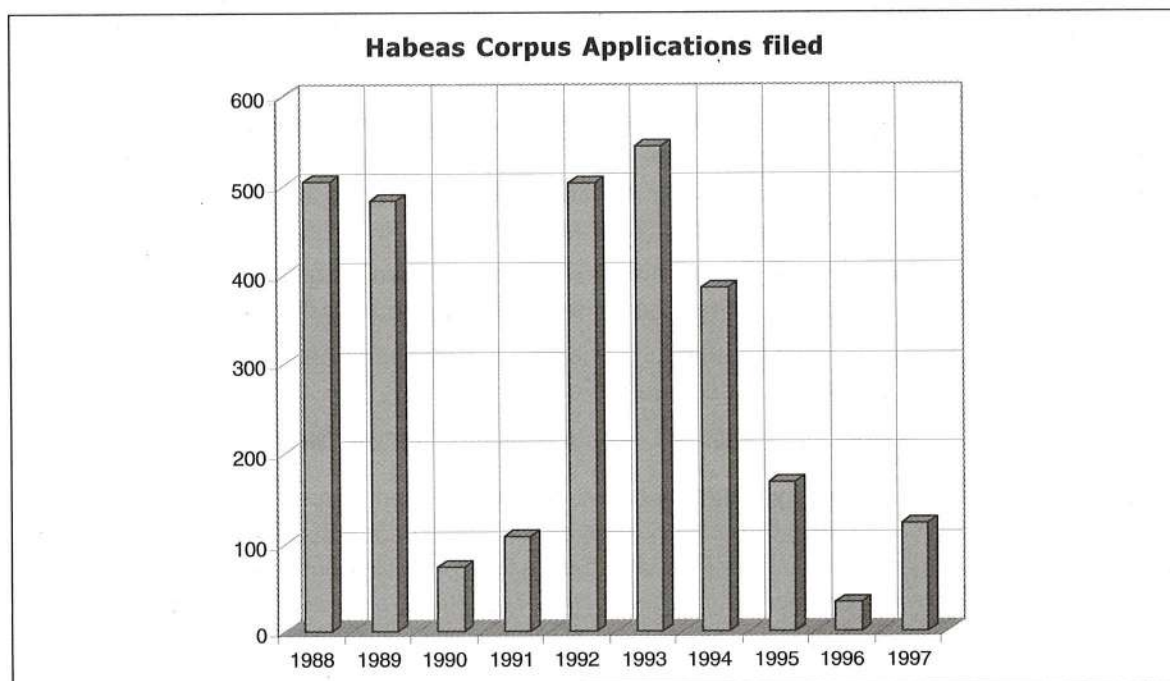
There is an urgent need for speedy investigations based on the findings of the four Disappearances Commissions. **The dangers that lurk from a delay in the conduct of investigations** is well illustrated by a recent decision of the Supreme Court where a Police officer's transfer was stopped on an application by him that his transfer was a violation of a Fundamental Right. He had submitted to Court that he had a good service record and that the transfer was *mala fide*. In fact two Commissions of Inquiry into Disappearances have made recommendations in the light of the evidence before them that this officer was responsible for several disappearances and had recommended legal action and disciplinary proceedings be initiated against him. But this fact was not before the Supreme Court when it considered the Fundamental Rights application of the officer. This would not have happened but for the delay in taking steps to prosecute this officer and take disciplinary action against him as recommended by the Disappearance Commissions. If such action had been taken this Police officer could not have pleaded that he had a clear record of service.

IV. The Enlargement of the Efficacy of Writ of the Habeas Corpus

The need for speed of response :- The writ of Habeas Corpus is a main plank in the prevention of disappearances from custody. First and foremost is the requirement of speed of response. The opportunity to invoke this jurisdiction no sooner a situation of unacknowledged custody arises, is the first requisite.

Enlargement of the Magistrate Court Jurisdiction in HCA matters :- Your Commissioners **recommend** the enlargement of the jurisdiction of the Magistrate Court to empower the Magistrate to receive the affidavits of the petitioner and his witness; to register the complaint; to entertain the petitioner's application that the Magistrate visits the place of alleged unacknowledged detention; to forward to the High Court the affidavit and the notes of visit etc. The existing jurisdiction to record evidence once a matter is referred to the Magistrate Court by the High Court, will continue, and the High Court shall continue to exercise jurisdiction in respect of the declaration of responsibility and compensation as at present.

A Special Division of the Magistrate's Court, Colombo :- It was the increase of arrests and detentions under the Emergency Regulations during the period relevant to this Commission that saw the use of the writ of Habeas Corpus as a challenge to the use of powers under the Emergency Regulations. A total of 2925 Habeas Corpus applications had been filed during the years 1988 to 1997.



The effectiveness of the remedy of Habeas Corpus became questionable however in view of the delay attendant on obtaining the relief. A perusal of the break-up of the Habeas Corpus applications filed and pending, (vide chart) shows that out of 2925 cases have been filed between 1988 and 1997. Of those 272 have not been concluded as yet, while most of the applications were disposed of after a lapse of over 5 years. In most of the areas outside the Eastern Province the facility for Habeas Corpus Applications to be filed in the High Court was not availed of. This facility made it easier for petitioners to have access to the Courts to locate abducted persons. However, the Habeas Corpus applications received by the High Court of Batticaloa appears to have been dealt with more expeditiously, out of 49 filed between 1994 & 1997, 44 have already disposed of.

It is recommended that a **Special Division of the Magistrate's Court Colombo should be established in order to deal with the Habeas Corpus Applications pending in the Court of Appeal since 1988.**¹⁰ Petitioners must feel they have had the attention of the Courts. It is important that **notices should go out anew** to the petitioners from the Court of Appeal in respect of their applications.

The Consequences of an adverse finding on a Habeas Corpus Application :- should not be confined to the payment of damages by the State alone, but **should include disciplinary action against the individual officers responsible.** Where individual officers are found responsible for such violations the following consequences should follow :

- (a) The human rights record of the person responsible, be it a member of the armed forces or the police, should be taken into account in the consideration of promotions of such personnel.
- (b) Such person who is under investigation for involvement in disappearances should be interdicted and suspended from active duty until inquiries are completed.
- (c) In any case those found guilty should not benefit from indemnity legislation.

Problems of recovery of sums awarded by Court had arisen even after successfully completion of an application. In many cases the respondents had appealed against the order and had either died while the case was pending or left the Island before the conclusion of the appeal. Consequently the applicants had not got the benefit of the awards. **It is therefore recommended that,**

- (a) The respondent be required to **deposit the sum awarded in Court pending appeal**;
- (b) The **obligation to pay the award be available against the respondents assets** and if he died, against his estate.

Legal Aid :- The remedy of Habeas Corpus should be made affordable to any citizen irrespective of his financial resources. We therefore **recommend that Legal Aid organisations providing their services to applicants for a writ of Habeas Corpus be made recipients of State grants.**¹¹

v. Emergency Regulations

The expansion of the powers given under the Regulations to the Police and the Armed Forces accompanied by the reduction of the occasions and degree of scrutiny by the judicial system, assisted in creating an environment within which the incidents reported to the Commission took place. **This Commission accordingly recommends the utilisation of the powers under the state of emergency be minimised.**

The Commission further **recommends** that the **underlying principles** to the Regulations made under emergency powers should be as follows:

Scrutiny of Emergency Regulations:- This Commission **recommends a mechanism be set up within Parliament** entrusted with the specific task of the scrutiny of each Regulation before its monthly promulgation by Parliament, and that **Human Rights Groups be given opportunity to make submissions** in the course of the month to this structure. Currently, whilst the extension of the Emergency itself is subjected to discussion by Parliament on a monthly basis and the Public Security Ordinance provides that Parliament may revoke, amend or modify a regulation, a scrutiny of the Regulation rarely takes place.

Publicity to the content of Regulations:- The Regulations which should be worded in clear and unambiguous language and be drafted under the supervision of the Legal Draughtsman, should be given wide publicity **through the media each month** at the time of their renewal.¹²

Enlargement of the Magistrate's Power in respect of Detention Orders :- The Commission **recommends** that the Magistrate be empowered when inquiring into the extension of the Detention Order **to require the Secretary to provide supplementary information** regarding the Detention Order, for example information on the continuing necessity of detention.

Strict observation of the pre-requisites for the Regulations to become operative:- The pre-requisites for the regulations to become operative are the pre-requisites, also, for the prevention or the limitation of disappearances and related abuses. While the Supreme Court has repeatedly emphasised that the requirements laid down in the Regulations for their provisions to come into operations "were not intended for merely cosmetic purposes, but for the sake of fulfilling the basic obligation of the State to ensure the personal security and liberty of all persons"¹³, **a concerted and continuous effort of compliance is required on the part of all branches of the Security Forces and the Police, for the prevention of Disappearances and a resurgence of the conditions that predisposed Disappearances.**

VI. The Re-assertion of the principle of Chain-of-Command Responsibility

The efficacy of the preventive measures considered here, whether of criminal liability, disciplinary inquiries, entry in service records etc, would be set at nought without the re-assertion of the fundamental principle of the accountability of superiors, or "Chain-of-Command Responsibility". It is very important that very clear directions are made available for the future, defining the accountability of Chain-of-Command structures. **Officials with Chain-of-Command responsibility who order or tolerate "disappearance" by those under their command should incur themselves criminal liability invariably.**¹⁴

VII. The need to dismantle "Alternative Structures of Command" and the Prevention of their coming into existence

This Commission finds that an alternative structure came into being in the Police during the relevant period, with Officers being promoted through political patronage. The elimination of alternative structure of command is a prerequisite for prevention. In this context **we recommend that steps be taken without delay against miscreants identified by the Commissions or on complaints made in the ordinary course of investigation.** It follows that legal action will ensue where warranted.

VIII. The Elimination of the Possibility of the Maintenance of a "Private Army" at State expense

The maintenance of a considerable number of armed personnel as security guards etc of politicians at state expense, was a feature of the period under consideration, which requires to be dismantled immediately. Persons selected by the politicians were given the rank and emoluments of Army Personnel. They were paid by the Army, armed by the Army, but not controlled by the Army though nominally employed in the Army's function of the protection of society from its enemies. These "soldiers" saw their role rather in the sphere of moving against personal enemies, acting for personal benefit or moving against the opponent of the politicians concerned. The security of public figures should be provided by a special security coordination Division of the Police. Officers attached to this division should be subjected to the command and supervision of superior officers in the service and be subject to periodical transfer.

IX. A Police Lay-Visitors' Panel for each Police Area

It is necessary to re-establish community-based forces and procedures to which the citizens can turn when faced with the possible misuse of police powers i.e. State power. **Such community-based structures have an invaluable part to play in the areas both of monitoring and of preventing the misuse of powers.**

To serve this function we recommend a Panel of Lay-Visitors from each Police Station area, with powers to speak to detainees, to check conditions of detention, to check records of police station in respect of detention, to liaise in the presentation of complaints to the police station, to liaise with the SSP/DIG of the area, to accompany to the police station when requested to do so, to make **complaints themselves** in a representative capacity, inclusive of impending problems, **the coordination at local level with the Human Rights Commission could be an aspect of their work with importance for the restoration of Law and Order nationally.**

X. A Citizens' Advisory Bureau

A System of Citizens Advisory Bureaus located in the vicinity of every Divisional Secretariat would be a valuable aid to the whole community for advice on various matters. In the context of disappearances specifically such a system is required for the assistance of bereaved persons on where to go and what to do to obtain the requisite assistance.¹⁵

XI. Dissemination of the Reports of the Disappearances Commissions

Wide publicity should be given to all the Reports of the Commissions of Inquiry into Disappearances, with their contents translated into Sinhala and Tamil. There has already been a delay in publishing the earlier Reports in Sinhala and Tamil. The absence of an adequate number of copies of these Reports and the absence of translations in Sinhala and Tamil defeat the purpose of appointing fact finding Commissions. The people of the Country must have access to the findings of these Commissions. These Reports form the nucleus of a Historical Memory of this era in Sri Lanka. **The translations should be made available to all school libraries and reading rooms in Community Centres, islandwide, at State Cost. The need to create a culture of respect for Human Rights requires that text books on both History and Social Studies should include the findings of these Commissions.**

XII. The Manifestation of the requisite Political will.

The **three Commissions on Disappearances** appointed in November 1994 and the appointment of this Commission in June 1998 with islandwide jurisdiction, was an important manifestation of the Political Will to come to grips with the problems which the Commissions have found to exist and the **provision of the necessary infrastructure to enable the four Commissions between them to give attention to every single petitioner** to them, evidenced the continuity of this intention.

This Country's immediate past history of non-prosecution of abuses of human rights despite the criminal nature of such acts under the law of that time, makes clear that the **several prosecutions that have now commenced** would not have been possible without the political will that the principle of accountability should prevail in respect of human rights abuses. That these prosecutions are taking place irrespective of the date of abuse, and in a period of a confrontation with an armed group, is a uniquely encouraging manifestation of the requisite political will, which must continue to be re-inforced.

The establishment, concurrently, of a **Human Rights Commission** by legislative enactment addresses the need for a structure with power to monitor situations of possible abuse in the present and in the future -

"For the purpose of discharging its functions the Commission may exercise any or all of the following powers:

- a. investigate, any infringement or imminent infringement of fundamental rights in accordance with the succeeding provisions of this Act;
- b. appoint such number of sub-committees at Provincial level, as it considers necessary to exercise such powers of the Commission as may be delegated to them, by the Commission, under this Act;
- c. intervene in any proceedings relating to the infringement or imminent infringement of fundamental rights, pending before any court, with the permission of such court;
- d. monitor the welfare of persons detained either by a judicial order or otherwise, by regular inspection of their places of detention, and to make such recommendations as may be necessary for improving their conditions of detention;"

The fact that this enactment was passed by Parliament without division is a good augury for the future, as is the appointment of Commissioners who between them, represent all ethnic, religious and cultural diversities of Sri Lanka.

The **vigorous enlistment of civil society** which is envisaged by the provisions in the enabling Act for the use of Mediators by the Human Rights Commission for the resolution of disputes, is an indicator of the political will, that civil society should be a co-partner with the State in the restoration of normalcy to our beleaguered land.

To : All Government Agents

ASSISTANCE FOR MOST AFFECTED PERSONS

01. Applications for payment of assistance in respect of deaths that may have occurred and injuries sustained as a result of ethnic violence, terrorist activity, related security operations and consequent civil unrest, since 24th July 1983 can be considered under this scheme.
02. Hitherto, these applications had been received, processed and payments affected, directly by this Ministry. It is now proposed to implement the scheme as amended by the Cabinet decision of 31.08.88, with the help of Government Agents. Accordingly, from 15.10.88 the issue of application forms, receiving completed application forms, processing of applications, approvals and payments to eligible applicants will be handled by the Government Agents with assistance from their appropriate staff. Payment on applications for assistance in respect of deaths or injuries should be personally approved by the Government Agent in accordance with the instructions given in this Circular.
03. Funds available for this programme are limited. Hence, extreme care should be taken to avoid duplication of payments specially in view of the fact that claims can be made by more than one person, or more than in one district, in respect of a particular death or injury and besides claims are likely to be made for missing persons in respect of whom proof of death cannot be conclusively established. Lists of cases already paid by this Ministry are sent herewith for your information. In processing applications you should get an officer to check them against the lists and obtain an endorsement to the effect that no payment has been made previously on each application form before approving a payment.
04. According to the new scheme, assistance can be given on the following basis:-

(a) Deaths

- (i) Death of a married person : Rupees Fifty Thousand (Rs.50,000/-)

This can be paid to the surviving spouse. If the spouse of the deceased is dead, the amount can be paid to the dependant children on an equitable basis or the next-of-kin, as the

case may be. Recipients of assistance may be encouraged and suitable arrangements be made as far as possible to ensure the well being of dependant children.

- (ii) Death of an unmarried adult- 21 years of age and above: Rupees Twenty Five thousand (Rs. 25,000/-)

This can be paid to the next-of-kin.

- (iii) Death of a minor (below 21 years of age) : Rupees Fifteen Thousand. (Rs. 15,000/-)

This can be paid to the next-of-kin. (In interpreting the term "next-of-kin", you may use your discretion to choose a member of the family who will, in your opinion, be the best person to ensure the welfare of the dependants).

Please note that the Cabinet decision of 31.08.88 has increased the assistance payable in respect of the death of a married person from Rs. 25,000/- to Rs. 50,000/-. However, the difference will not be paid to those cases for which payment has already been made.

(b) Injuries:

Assistance in respect of an injured person can be paid on the recommendation of a Government Medical Officer who will be required to certify the percentage of loss of earning capacity arising from partial or permanent disablement. In this connection, please see General Circular 1579, (Reference No.MA/4/88) of 18.07.88 issued by the Director General of Health Services, a copy of which is attached. The specimen format sent herewith (M/R & UAS/MAP/3) may be used to obtain the report from a Government Medical Officer.

- (i) **Injury to an adult** (21 years of age and above at the time of the incident):

Up to a maximum of a Rupees Twenty Five Thousand (Rs.25,000/-) depending on the percentage of loss of earning capacity or disability recommended by the Medical Officer.

- (ii) **Injury to a minor** (below 21 years of age at the time of the incident):

Up to a maximum of Rupees Fifteen Thousand (Rs.15,000/-) depending on the percentage of loss of earning capacity or disability as recommended by the Medical Officer.

In determining the quantum of payment, percentage of loss of earning capacity of disability recommended by the Medical Officer should be directly correlated to the extent of assistance payable,

Eg : Injury to an adult-

If percentage of loss of earning capacity or disability recommended by the Medical Officer is 50%, amount payable will be:

Rs. 25,000 x 50 = Rs.12,500/-

100

Injury to a minor-

If percentage of loss of earning capacity or disability recommended by the Medical Officer is 50%, amount payable will be:

Rs. 15,000 x 50 = Rs.7,500/-

100

However, if percentage recommended is 70% or above, 100% assistance could be paid. If the Medical Officer does not specifically mentioned a percentage but certifies disability, minimum percentage on the scale, i.e. 5% may be considered.

05. Applications on form M/R & R/UAS/MAP/2 should be issued in duplicate by the A.G.A after ascertaining facts. In districts where "Family Registration Cards" have been issued to the affected families, the A.G.A. should use the cards in determining the eligibility for this assistance. In such instances, A.G.A. will indicate the Family Registration Card Number in the box provided on the right hand top corner of the application form.
06. One copy of the application form should be signed by the applicant on a Rs.1/- stamp and duly attested by a J.P., while the applicant's signature on the duplicate form need not be on a Rs.1/- stamp but it should be attested by the same J.P. In the case of eligible applicants, the G.A.'s endorsement of acceptance should be placed on both copies of applications. The second copy should be sent to this Ministry along with the monthly return referred to in para 19 of this Circular.
07. Applications should be supported by relevant documents. For instance, the Death Certificate and the Postmortem Report would be important to prove death and cause of death. Birth Certificate would be relevant in determining whether the deceased or the injured was and adult or a minor. Marriage Certificate will be vital to decide on the civil status of the deceased. Further, when the spouse is not the applicant, documents to prove next-of-kin or relationship may be very important. Where injuries are concerned, the Medical Certificate should distinctly state the percentage of loss of earning capacity. In the case of minors, this may reflect disability only.
08. Death Certificates in the case of assistance in respect of deaths and Medical Certificates from a Government Medical Officer in respect of

injuries must necessarily be obtained. Where other documentary evidence mentioned in para 7 is either inadequate or unobtainable, genuineness and eligibility of an applicant will be determined personally by the Government Agent based on his inquiries.

09. Perfected applications will be received by Grama Seva Niladhari who will acknowledge the receipt of applications in the detachable section at part VII of the application form and forward the applications promptly with his report to the A.G.A. concerned. A.G.A. in turn will submit the applications without delay with his recommendations and comments to the Government Agent.
10. A specimen check list, used in this office, with suitable modifications is sent herewith for your guidance in approving the assistance.
11. For the purpose of effecting payments, a voucher on Form Gen. 35 signed on a Rs.1/- stamp should be obtained from the applicant once the payment is approved. However, the Government Agent must ensure that payments are effected without inordinate delay.
12. Payment should be made by cheque in favour of the Manager of the Bank concerned to be credited to the applicant's Bank Account (Current or Savings). Cheque should be crossed "Account Payee Only" and sent direct to the applicant. A covering letter should be annexed along with the cheque explaining the procedure to be followed.
13. Payments should be charged to Head 192, Programme 1, Project 1, Object Code 05, Object Detail 9 [(192-1-1-05 (9)] under which allocations could be obtained from this Ministry.
14. Original certificates and documents will be suitably franked and returned to the applicant along with the cheque after perusal and verification by your office. Arrangements should be made to have certified copies or Photostat copies of such certificates filed with relevant documents for usual audit purposes.
15. You may issue appropriate instructions separately to A.G.A.s and G.S.N. s for the effective implementation of this scheme and take other suitable action to prevent the possibility of irregular or incorrect payments.
16. This scheme does not cover victims who were at the time of incidents employees of Government, State Corporations including STATE Banks, Local Bodies or any other state owned institutions. These cases will be handled by their respective employers in terms of circular instructions issued by the Ministry of Public Administration or under their own schemes. This scheme is however applicable to those who were pensioners at the time of incidents.
17. Claims which are strictly not covered by this scheme should not be entertained.

18. Any further information or clarification on this Circular may be obtained from this Ministry, if necessary.
19. Monthly returns of payments effected in respect of Deaths and Injuries should be rendered separately in respect of each A.G.A.'s Division on the formats attached hereto (M/R & R/UAS/MAP/5 for Deaths and M/R & R/UAS/MAP/6 for Injured) along with copies of relevant applications to reach this Ministry not later than 15th of the following month. These returns should be forwarded with a covering letter listing the returns sent and certifying that they represent the complete list for the month. If any particulars of any A.G.A.'s Division are not included it should be so indicated.
20. A specimen copy of form No. M/R & R/UAS/MAP/2 is sent herewith. Your requirements of this form will be supplied subsequently.

2. The following decisions have been taken by the Government in regard to
the above scheme:
- (a) This scheme should be extended to cover :subversive related
activity" in addition to categories of incidents mentioned in the
above circulars.
 - (b) This scheme should be applicable to incidents occurred whether on
duty or not.
 - (c) The package of payments outlined in this scheme should cover all
cases of death/injury occurred due to terrorist/subversive
activities prior to the date of this circular provided such cases
satisfy the requirements of this scheme.
 - (d) The daily paid workers, casual workers in the Public, Corporation
and Co-operative Sectors should be entitled to the benefits in
terms of this scheme.
 - (e) In order to expedite payment of compensation to dependants of
deceased officers/employees the A.G.A. ("Divisional Secretaries"
- Please note that Chief Secretaries of Provincial Councils have
been informed to change the designation of the Division -Assistant
Government Agents to that of "Division Secretary" of the Provincial
Council with effect from 01.10.89 by my letter No.ABK/N/Gen/GA
dated 21st September 89) should initially process the applications
for compensation under the supervision of the Government Agent of
the area and forward such applications to the respective Ministry/
Department/ Corporation for payment.

3. The existing scheme for Public Officers will be operative as amended by para (2) of this circular. However the officer or dependants of such deceased officer will be eligible for relief mentioned in Public Administration Circular No. 346 dated 08.10.96, if such relief is more beneficial, but not both. Accordingly (only for the purposes of such payment) you may treat that Public Administration Circular No. 346 dated 08.10.86 is suitably amended in terms of para (2) of this Circular.
4. The existing scheme for corporation employees will be co-operative as amended by para (2) of this circular. However, if there is a State assisted insurance of a compensation scheme which is more beneficial, relief could be sought under such schemes but employees are not eligible to claim relief from both schemes.
5. The existing scheme for Public Officers will be applicable to the staff of a Member of Parliament subject to the conditions of such employment. However, to be eligible for benefits of this scheme, names of such persons should have been registered at the Ministry of Justice and Parliamentary Affairs.
6. Members of Boards of Directors of Public Corporations, Boards of Directors of Co-operatives and Co-operative Employees will be eligible for the medical aid allowance and compensation for loss of earning capacity as in the case of a Public Officer. In case of death due to terrorist/subversive activity, the dependants will be eligible for an ex-gratia payment of Rs. 100,000/-. If funds are not available the Treasury will provide funds to such institutions. In any case salaries etc would not be paid to such persons.
7. A Committee comprising the Secretary, Ministry of Defence, the Secretary to the Minister of State for Trade and the Secretary to the Minister of State for Public Administration, has been appointed to resolve difficulties in interpreting the provisions of this circular and Public Administration Circulars mentioned above. Therefore, such cases should be referred to the Secretary to the Ministry of Defence.
8. The dependants of Public Officers and Teachers who resigned to contest the Provincial Councils Elections and the Parliamentary Elections and who were killed while they were Candidates for such Election, should be paid their normal salaries till such time as those killed would have reached the normal age of retirement and their pensions thereafter.
9. The following clarifications are also made to facilitate respective authorities in expediting matters connected with the above.
 - I. Sub Post Masters and substitute labourers in Govt. Depts. are entitled to benefits of this scheme.
 - II. When the salary of an officer is to be paid in terms of P.A. Circular 343 dated 25.09.86, the amount should be calculated on the basis laid down in para 2C (i) of P.A. Circular No. 21/88 dated 13.07.88 (to be read with para,03,04,05)

III. Your attention is drawn to the interpretation of the word "Gender" in para 1 of Chapter I of the Establishments code. This interpretation should be applied when interpreting the words "officer", "employee", "wife" or "husband".

IV. The ex-gratia payment as compensation to be paid in relation to the loss of earning capacity is given in para IB ii OF Public Administration Circular No.21/88 dated 13.07.88. When the loss of earning capacity given in the medical report falls in between the given percentages the compensation payable should be decided on a proportional basis.

The Committee will be grateful if you could issue a letter under your hand confirming the results of the search.

This Committee seeks your co-operation in its efforts to find out what happened to those persons who are alleged to have disappeared during that period.

In this connection your attention is drawn to section 21 of the Human Rights Commission Act No 21 of 1996.



Investigations into Disappearances in Jaffna


A Committee composed of Dr. Devanesan Nesiah (Chairman), Mr. K.H. Camillus Fernando and Ms. Jezima Ismail, appointed with powers delegated by the Human Rights Commission, is investigating into several complaints of disappearances of persons in the North.

You will appreciate that both in the interest of ascertaining the facts and also ensuring that all viewpoints are taken into account before the Committee formulated its Report, it is important to record not only the evidence of the relatives of the disappeared but also that of the armed personnel involved in those events. Accordingly, following its first sessions of hearings in Jaffna, the Committee has found it necessary to get the assistance of a few army personnel who were deployed in the North during the relevant period to clarify certain information that has emerged. A request to trace some such personnel has already been sent to the Army Commander on 13 January 2003. The Army Commander responded with his letter No. CA/LEC/350/HRC/136 of 28th January 2003 seeking further time to provide the necessary information.

In the meantime, it has become necessary to check on certain events that took place in the Chavakachcheri area when Lt. Col. Duminda Keppetiwala of 8 Sinha Regiment was in charge of the Navatkuli army camp during June/July, 1996.

We shall therefore be grateful if you would kindly direct the Army Commander to instruct Lt. Col. Duminda Keppetiwala of the 8 Sinha Regiment to meet the members of the Committee on Disappearances at 3 p.m. on Monday 10th February 2003 on the Fourth Floor of the Office of the Human Rights Commission, No. 36, Kynsey Road, Colombo 8, together with any books or documents which he can access, that could help this Committee in the investigations.

A. You letter No. CBP/09 dated 13th January 2003.

1. In response to above, steps were taken to trace the military personnel mentioned therein through the Security Force Headquarters Jaffna. However, they inform of their inability to obtain further information as the details furnished is insufficient, and also because the names of individuals provided are incomplete/nicknames.
2. With regard to the referred military camps, too, they are unable to provide required details due to its temporary nature in having to shift camps periodically in response to existing situations. Furthermore, most of the camps in question were also subject to LTTE attacks in the year 2000/2001, resulting in the destruction of many documents and records.
3. However, please be assured of our continued assistance, should there be a possibility of furnishing us with further details. I would also like to brief and discuss with the investigating officer and to make my own suggestions to find ways and means of proceeding further with regard the said disappearances.
4. Assuring you of our highest consideration.

Investigations into Complaints of Disappearances

The committee appointed under Section 11 (b) of the Human Rights Commission of Sri Lanka Act No. 21 of 1996 is investigating into complaints of disappearances of persons in the Jaffna District received by the Human Rights Commission. In the course of the investigations into these complaints the names of the security personnel in the annexed list transpired.

The assistance of the Commander of the Army was sought to trace the present whereabouts of the respective security personnel to enable the Committee to find out what had happened to the disappeared persons concerned. After much effort a reply was received stating his inability to trace them because, *inter alia*, the details furnished are "in sufficient and also because the names of individuals provided are incomplete/ nicknames".

However due to the efforts of the Investigation Officers of the Committee, we were able to trace two of them - No. (11) Duminda Keppetiwala and No. (27) Sampath Rajapakse and their statements were recorded. It has therefore become necessary to urge the Commander of the Army to make a determined effort to trace these persons with the available information so that this Committee could come to a reasonable finding on what had actually happened to the persons alleged to have disappeared from the Jaffna District during 1996 and 1997.

I am therefore directed by Dr. Devanesan Nesiiah, Chairman of the Committee on Disappearances, to submit the annexed list to you seeking your assistance to make the Commander of the Army to provide the necessary information.



As you could see the reply is evasive and unrelated to our inquiries. All that we require is to trace the security personnel concerned. It merely says that the files in respect of certain persons who had disappeared have been sent to the CID when all that this Committee requires is the present whereabouts of the personnel named.

Your urgent intervention to provide the information required would be appreciated as this Committee is to complete its task shortly.

TRAINING SECURITY PERSONNEL INVOLVED IN CAUSING DISAPPEARANCES

Ref:

- A. Your letter dated 25.07.2003.
- B. This HQ letter dated 25.09.2003.
- C. Your letter dated 08.10.2003.

1. The Army through the Directorate of Human Rights and Humanitarian Law made inquiries from the several Army Establishments/ Headquarters that possibly could have had any information regarding the particular 44 cases of disappearances referred to by the letter at reference "A" by your Committee, which are alleged to have occurred in 1996.

2. The presence of Lieutenant Colonel D C Keppetiwala referred to as Duminda, allegedly responsible in the disappearances in ten cases of your list of 44 cases was made available before the committee as required.

3. The year 1996 is when the Army was heavily involved in operational duties in Jaffna and the movement of troops depended on the urgency and the immediate need in the particular area and due to the security situation that prevailed during the said period most of the troop changes had been unrecorded and undocumented. Further even documents that had been maintained in relation to various administrative and operational matters in the Army had been destroyed due to various terrorist attacks on the camps.

4. Further adding to the above facts the inadequate information regarding the alleged person responsible for the disappearance where no initials, Regimental Numbers, Regiment, and even in some cases correct rank had not been given in the list provided by the Committee to trace the said individuals, has resulted in the Army having made every effort possible, failing to identify the persons required due to paucity of information.

5. The list submitted by the letter at Ref "B" above by this HQ is where the CID had made inquiries and the Provost Marshal of the Army had submitted documents to the CID.


6. It is also brought to your kind notice that prior to the appointment of the present Commission there were two other investigating bodies that had been appointed to inquire into the disappearances in the North and based on their reports the CID had taken action to institute criminal proceedings against persons held responsible. The Army too had held their own inquiries in 1997 and managed to reduce the list of reported disappearances of 1100 to nearly 378 in the Northern Province due to the following reasons.

a. Names of person alleged to have disappeared being duplicated and sometimes Triplicated.

b. Those reported to be missing had returned to their kith and kin, but had not reported the fact of their return to the authorities.

7. Further the Military Police continued their investigations wherever possible to trace the persons directly or indirectly responsible for disappearances and such cases had been handed over to the CID to facilitate prosecution. Related trivial offences had been disciplinarily dealt with by the Army authorities. Further the Army had published standing orders to prevent the occurrence of similar incidents in the future.

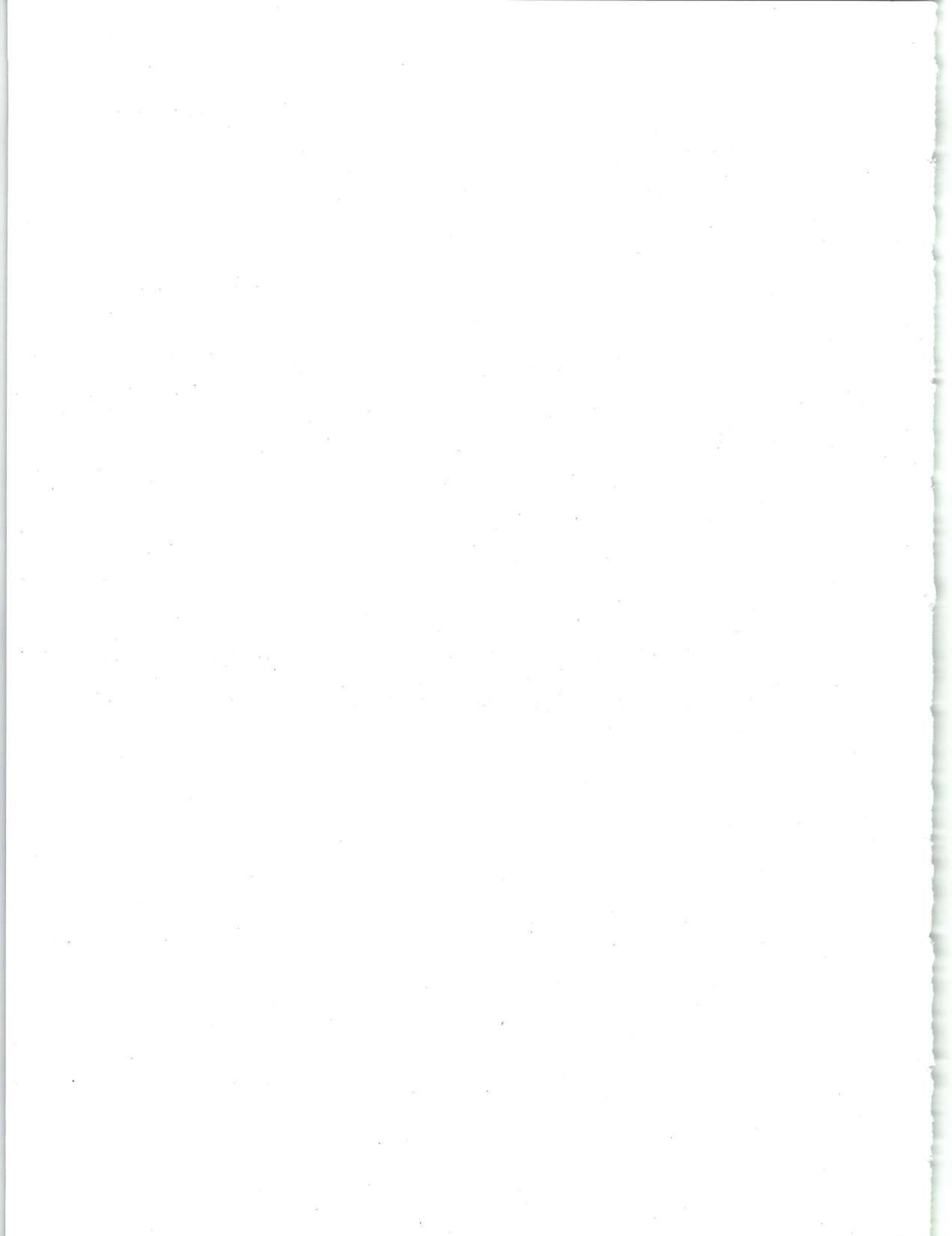

each Complaint Inquired into**



The relevant particulars in brief in respect of each complaint inquired into by the Committee

There is evidence that the victim had been riding a bicycle on the road at Chemmani on 15/07/96 when he was arrested by soldiers from the Ariyalai Army Camp. This was seen by Rasathi who conveyed the information to the complainant Balasingham, who is now dead. The victim's sister Parupatham who gave evidence at the inquiry stated that all attempts to find him in the Ariyalai Army Camp were fruitless.

Victim : S. Satgunarajah
Complainant : S. Ranjanidevi

The victim had been arrested at the Manipay market on 04.01.1997 when he was on his way to Chulipuram from Kaithady. He had been taken by soldiers who came in a van to the theatre at Manipay. A search was made at the Army Camp in Manipay but he could not be found.

Victim : Kaneshalingam Kirupakaran
Complainant : S. Kaneshalingam

There is evidence that the victim who was a very bright student, had been arrested during a round up on 19.07.1996 by the Army at Maruvanpulavu. Lt. Col. Duminda Keppetiwala of the Navatkuli Army Camp had conducted the round up. All attempts by the father to trace him had been fruitless.

Victim : Ponnar Raveenthiran
Complainant : R. Jeyarane

There is evidence that the victim was taken into custody on 19/06/1996 in the presence of his wife by Colonel Duminda Keppetiwala during a round up at the Navatkuli School, on being identified by a masked man. Thereafter he had been taken blindfolded in a truck along with about 100 others. Complainant had complained to the Kopy Police a week later and thereafter to the Chavakachcheri Police. She had also met Colonel Duminda of the Navatkuli Camp who had told her not to worry as he would be released soon. But the victim never returned.

Victim : Ramanathan Annalingam
Complainant : Annalingam Jeyakala

There is evidence that the victim had been arrested on 19.07.1996 from his home at Aladi Junction at Maruwanpulovu during a round up on being identified by masked informers. The entire household was lined up before the informers and the victim was detained while the others were released. He was later seen

handcuffed and blindfolded at the Navatkuli Rice Mill, along with about 100 others in similar conditions. Nothing was heard of him thereafter.

There is evidence that the victim was a Brahmin who had been taken away from his temple adjoining his house on 25/05/1996 while performing religious duties. He had just returned from school where he was a teacher. Those who took him were army personnel in civil who later got down their vehicles and took him away after getting into their uniforms. The entire neighbourhood witnessed the arrest. Nothing is known of his whereabouts thereafter.

The complainant is getting the salary of her husband from the Education Department on certificate issued by the AGA confirming the victim's disappearance.

There is evidence that the victim was a hiring car driver. He had been taken by the army with his Morris Oxford car No. 5 Sri 6669, on 18.05.1996 between the District Hospital and the Assistant Government Agents Office at Chavakachcheri. In spite of all attempts to find him, including a Habeas Corpus application, he could not be found. Even his car has disappeared.

There is evidence that Ambihaibalan who was a student in the advanced level class, was arrested at a round up on 19.07.1996 by the army. The complainant had thereafter met Duminda, the Officer in charge of the Navatkuli army camp, and Captain Sunil of the same camp but could not get any information about him. He is missing since then.

Complainant : S. Murugan

There is evidence that this victim and M. Sivarasa (CHA/052) were brothers who had been arrested at a round up on 19.07.1996 by the army at Maruvanpuloivu along with about a 100 others, of whom 24 are yet missing. Duminda who was in charge of the army camp at Navatkuli had been approached by the complainant and others but could not get any of them released.

Victim : S. Selvanathan
Complainant : S. Kamaladevi

There is evidence that the victim had been arrested at the Thanankilappu Sentry Point on 30.07.1996 while returning after visiting a relative. Five days later the complainant had gone to the Chavakachcheri army camp which was under one Alwis. The army officer who was at the sentry point concerned had noticed the resemblance of the complainant, who was the mother of the victim, whom he had arrested, had told her that her son Selvanathan had been taken to Palaly for interrogation. The victim had never returned thereafter.

Victim : **Ponniah Jeyarajah**
Complainant : **E. Ponniah**

There is evidence that the victim was arrested at a round up on 19.07.1996 on being identified by a masked informer. The OIC of the Navatkuli Camp Duminda and Capt. Sunil were among the army officers who took the victim away. There is no information on what happened to the victim thereafter.

Victim : **V. Udayakumar**
Complainant : **K. Veluppillai**

There is evidence that the victim had been arrested by the army on 17.06.1997 at the Eruvan Sentry Point to which the father, the complainant had been ordered by the Area Commander of the army to bring the victim. An acknowledgement had been given to the complainant who was asked to leave the victim behind. When the complainant went in the afternoon to see his son, the acknowledgement was forcibly taken away from him. Now he has no record of the son being handed to the army. However one Thirunavukkarasu, the Principal of the Kodikamam Mixed School and the Grama Sevaka Thangamylan had been witnesses to the handing over of the victim to the Eruvan Sentry Point.

Complainant : **P. Arumugasamy**

There is evidence that the victim who was a carpenter, was arrested at a round up at Thatchanthoppu on 19.07.1996 by a group of army officers headed by Col. Duminda, Area Commander of the Navatkuli Army Camp. There is no trace of him thereafter. The virtual complainant P. Thangamany is dead. The victim's elder brother Arumugasamy gave evidence.

There is evidence that the victim was arrested from his home during a round up on 19.07.1996 by the army. He had been seen blindfolded and handcuffed at the Thatchanthoppu V.C. Office before being taken away by the army along with others. In spite of complaints to the ICRC and the Police, the victim could not be found.

There is evidence that the victim who was a bicycle mechanic had been arrested at a round up by the army on the 19.07.1996 at Kaithady. There is no trace of him thereafter.

Complainant : **V. Kamala**

There is evidence that the victim who returned after about 5 years in Saudi Arabia was arrested by the army at a roundup on 19.07.1996 at Thatchanthoppu. The army officers were led by Duminda, the Officer in charge of the Navatkuli Camp. The search for him at the army camps in the area did not bear fruit. A Habeas Corpus case filed also did not help to trace him.

There is evidence that the victim who was a fisherman had been arrested at a round up by the army on 19.07.1996 at Alady, Maruvampulavu. The other members of his family too had been taken and lined up with several others before a masked informer. 20 of them had been detained while the others were released. The victim was one of those detained. He was never seen thereafter. Complaints made to the ICRC, the KKS Police, and the President of Sri Lanka had all been of no avail.

There is evidence that the victim was arrested at a round up by the army on 19.07.1996 at Navatkuli. Col. Duminda was one of the army officers who conducted the roundup. There is no information about the victim thereafter.

 Complainant : S. Sithamparapillai

There is evidence that the victim, a fisherman who had a physical disability, was arrested at a round up by the army at Maruvampulovu on 19.07.1996. He had been arrested once before and had been released. But on this occasion nothing was heard of him thereafter. The round up had been conducted by the army officers from the Navatkuli Camp.

Victim : A. Kodeswaran
 Complainant : K. Easwary

*There is evidence that the victim had been arrested by the army and taken with his **motor cycle** on 04.08.1996, during a round up. He had gone to buy fish when this happened. His bike too is now missing. When the complainant went looking for him, Kodeswaran was found blindfolded in a house. His motorbike was outside the house. When Colonel Duminda who was there, was asked to release him, he had told the complainant that he would be released the following day after an inquiry.*

About 2 weeks earlier the victim had been a witness to an arrest of another person named Sellathurai Sivarasa. It is believed that this was a contributory the reason for his arrest. The victim's younger brother Adiparameswaran was arrested on the same day but was released three days later. Another person arrested on that day was released nine days later. But the victim and his motorcycle are still missing.

There is evidence that the victim was working at the Kaithady MPCs was arrested on 21.08.1996 and taken to Navatkuli in hiring Car by the army. Sellammah who is the mother of the victim had seen this. Jeyagowry the wife of the victim had joined Sellammah a little later. From Navatkuli the victim had been taken to Jaffna on bicycle. The complainant and Victim's wife Jeyagowry had followed them for a short distance. They do not know what happened to him thereafter even though a complaint had made to the ICRC on the same day.

Complainant suggests that a shop owner wanted to make the victim vacate from his shop and therefore gave false information to the army to get rid of him. The complainant went to Corporal Sampath Rajapakse and asked about the victim. He promised to inquire and find out. Next morning the family went to Pungunkulam and saw the victim with another young man in the Pungunkulam army camp. But they could not enter the camp. Captain Lalithhewa was at the camp, he is aware of the arrest. On year later, in 1997 Asoka Silva of the police, had reported that there were 87 persons in custody at Palaly and that the victim was among them. There is no trace of him thereafter.

The complainant believes that the arrest of the victim could have been because the elder brother of the victim had joined the LTTE.

When the complainant checked at the Koolavadi Camp the next day, he had been told that the victim was taken to some other camp. Complainant had then checked at Manipay Camp. There he had been told that the victim was taken to KKS Camp. He had found that the victim was not at the KKS Camp either. Thereafter there had been no information as to the whereabouts of the victim.

A girl, whose name is not known, had also informed the family that some persons dressed in uniforms similar to that of the army had taken away the victim. The victim had not been heard of since.

When this was pointed out to Asurasa, he said that it was general practice of the police to write whatever they thought fit when they went to make a statement. The complainant had no way of knowing what was written as it was in Sinhalese.

His parents had checked at Irupalai and Punnalaikadduwan army camps. They could not find him.

On 15.09.96 Rodrigo had asked the complainant for victim's **motorcycle** and the connected documents. Through fear she had given those documents. Then the army had painted the bike green and used it for their work. Selvanesan had disappeared but not his motorbike.

The arrest of the victim was also seen by one S. Rajathurai. She had learnt from some others later that the victim had been **made to do odd jobs** for the army. The complainant claims to have seen and identified the victim being taken around in a truck subsequently, dressed in army uniform and with his face covered by a mask. There is no further information about him since then.

*The complainant believes that the victim was arrested by the Uduvil Army Camp personnel. She claims that on the same day of arrest the victim was brought to the Kovil by the army, dressed in uniform and with his face covered, **to serve as a masked informer**. She said that she could recognize her son by many external signs in spite of his face being covered and being put into an army uniform. The victim had not been heard of since.*

When the complainant went to check for the victim at the camp, she had met an officer called Samarasinghe. He had said that he will look up the files and see whether the victim had been brought there. But nothing had come out of it and the victim had not been heard of since.

She had been summoned several times by the Chief Magistrate's of Colombo to give evidence in this connection. But nothing had come out of it. There had been no information about the son and the daughter thereafter.

The complainant's two children aged 3 months and 14 years were killed by a soldier who barged into her house on 07.12.1998. She was also shot and injured. The killings were publicly acknowledged by General Lohan Gunawardena who was in charge of the army in Jaffna during that period. This had been reported in the Udayan Newspaper of 10.12.1998 with an apology by the General to the public of Jaffna. Due to the intervention of the Committee, a sum of money is to be paid to the complainant as compensation. There had been a court case against the soldier concerned for murder. The accused soldier was given bail and had failed to attend court thereafter and is absconding.

But there had been no news of him so far.

After the second visit to see him in 1991 they could not see him again as they were displaced and had to leave Jaffna. There is no news of him since then.

It is possible that these persons had been taken away for manual work, since that was their field of activity. They are all missing since then.

Captain Dedigama was in charge of the camp. Nothing is known of her whereabouts since then. The other girl who was released, is not traceable.
